Good Relations Urged By Ortega

a depression mainly because they have so much money they don't know what to do with it. The greatest danger is inflation. In some South American countries prices are 150 per cent above what they were in 1939. The increase in Canada has been 80 per cent, in the United States 30 per cent and in China 1500 per cent. The reason prices have gone so high in China is that there is no attempted control there.

"Manufacturing in Latin America is about four times what it was before the war. Rockefeller said Latin America will have 10 billion dollars to spend for new merchandise in the first 10 years after the war. Latin America has almost doubled its capacity to produce. They could probably not meet competition in the heavy goods, but in the lighter goods the picture is brighter. Industries are more diversified, so that Latin America is more dependent than ever on other countries for food."

Mr. Ortega then pointed out some of the things that the United States can do to help Latin America. By minimizing the unfavorable factors, the United States could cushion Latin America, in its transition to normalcy.

"We must see that Latin America continues this production without a great drop in prices," the speaker said.

"We should extend our enterprises to Latin America in a direct way."

"We should increase our purchases in Latin America as much as possible even in the competitive goods."

"We should continue the reciprocal trade agreements and remove certain threats, such as excise taxes. We should be able to extend long time credit. We should create an inter-American merchant marine, develop to the fullest extent transportation of merchandise and passengers, should promote meetings of business men, create a world business council and repeal the Johnson act."

is in the European war theater. Another son, Sgt. Glenn Ward, who is in the Pacific war theater, is back in action after a siege of yellow fever.

T-Sgt. Wayne Piercy, who is with the 2nd air force in Colorado, arrived at his home in Newell Heights Friday on a 15-day furlough. Piercy has been stationed in Cheyenne, Wyoming most of the time since he completed his missions from a station in Italy.

Cpl. Loren King, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. King, has arrived in Spokane after undergoing a serious operation in an English hospital. He is now confined in a Spokane hospital. Cpl. King had the ex-

perience of being a German prisoner for two hours. This was the amount of time that elapsed before the rest of the division caught up to him and his group and took the Nazi captors prisoners.

The captors took his wrist watch and ring and when he asked for them back he received a severe beating. The property was recovered when the captors were captured. His wife is the former Ellen Bybee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. G. Bybee, formerly of Nyssa but now of Ontario.

Mr. and Mrs. Ira Ure received a large package Tuesday from their son, T-C Ira Ure Jr., who has crossed the Rhine and is in the best of spirits, and on the move. The flag is red calico and left flat by bombardment. He has

measures 12 feet wide and about 24 feet long. It has the large white circle in the center with the black German swastika in the center. Cpl. Ure said he "picked it up" when he was on the move, practically living in a machinist's truck. He describes the Rhine as larger than Snake river, and compares it with parts of the Columbia river.
