Q. Is it necessary for a claimant or a beneficiary under national insurance for any benefits need to secure the services of an attorney in filling out the papers to be presented to the veterans administration?

Ans. No, there is no necessity for such services of attorneys as the veterans facility of the administration will fill out claims without cost, and your service officer of any veterans organization will be able to take care of it. Notice: Contact your service officer of any veterans organization in your own locality and he will advise you as to procedure.

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use of mulches is another effective method of reducing evaporation of water from the soil. County Agent R. E. Brooke said. A mulch of lawn clippings, straw or leaves may be spread between the rows after the first or second cultivation of a seeded crop or any time after setting out plants, Mr. Brooke explains. The mulch will also help to control weeds. Wet leaves that have piled up over the winter may be thick in blankets about an inch thick. Lawn clippings need to be about two inches deep for effectiveness and dry straw three or four inches deep. Mulches are recommended as being especially good for reducing frost cracking and blossom end rot of tomatoes. Mr. Brooke recommends that tomatoes be mulched soon after the plants are set of conserving moisture, but the out.
