wounded. "Having administered medical aid to the officer and realizing the importance of immediate evacuation, Cpl. Points, in disregard for his own safety crawled 200 yards back to the ambulance with the casualty on his back, thereby saving valuable time getting the casualty to a station where surgery could be performed.

"By his heroic action, Cpl. Points reflected great credit upon himself and the entire military service." Cpl. Points spent most of his life in Nyssa.

Mr. and Mrs. S. D. Points of Boise route 2 received word from another son, Pvt. Harold Points that he has landed safely somewhere in France. He is a barber in a hospital. He also spent his school days in Nyssa.

VACANCIES TO BE OPEN AT ACADEMY

Congressman Lowell Stockman will have three vacancies at the U. S. military academy, West Point, New York, for the class beginning July 1, 1946.

Mr. Stockman also will have two vacancies at the U. S. naval academy, Annapolis, Maryland, for the class beginning July 1, 1956.

Candidates for the military academy must have reached their 17th birthday, but must not have reached their 22nd birthday on the date of entrance to the academy.

Candidates for the naval academy must be not less than 17 years of age nor more than 21 years of age on April 1 of the calendar year (1946) in which they enter the naval academy.

Applicants for both academies should be high school seniors or graduates of high school, or college students. The civil service commission expects to hold a competitive examination July 28, 1945 to aid in the selection of nominees for the academies. Applicants must be residents of the second congressional district of Oregon and in perfect physical condition.

All boys who are interested and qualified should write immediately to Congressman Lowell Stockman, House Office building, Washington, D. C., so that they may receive additional information and be admitted to the examination.

RUTHERFORD GETS JURY'S VERDICT

A jury last week returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff in a civil suit in Judge M. A. Biggs circuit court in Vale, in which H. M. Rutherford was suing W. J. Cape for \$462 damages for alleged breach of contract. The jury awarded him damages in the amount of \$440.

Rutherford said he had made an oral agreement with Cape a year ago to buy 286 head of cattle at \$62.50 and that Cape had failed to deliver 42 head. Subsequent to the agreement, Rutherford claimed, he had bargained to sell the cattle to Claude Derrick of Ontario for \$73.50 per head and the failure of Cape to deliver the remaining 42 head caused him to lose a profit of \$11 a head or \$462, which he would have had if the contract had been fulfilled. Cape argued that the plaintiff himself had first breached the contract, thus voiding it, and that he was therefore not bound to complete the transfer.

Blaine Hallock of Baker represented the plaintiff and Robert D. Lytle and Charles W. Swan the defendant.
