Something Great

Harriet Herrman delivered the salutatory, in which she observed that "When we were in the first grade Franklin D. Roosevelt was president of the United States. For the first time, a man remained in the presidency during the entire primary education of a class of students."

Miss Herrman pointed out that many other changes had occurred during the 12 years that the class has been attending school. Many members of the class came from Nebraska, Kansas, the Dakotas and other states in which drought and grasshoppers had been a scourge.

The depression "made it seem desirable to have more government control. During this time the Owyhee dam was built and the sagebrush land became productive soil. In December, 1941 the United States entered the war, the unemployment problem was solved and a labor shortage developed."

"Democracy stands for freedom of the individual. It should mean a minimum of control by the government. Our democratic constitution was developed from the sacrifices of many people throughout the ages."

The girls glee club directed by Mr. Davis sang "I Love a Little Cottage."

Clayton Morgan, delivering the valedictory, asked the question, "Will the war interfere with our education? The question is not as pertinent since Germany was defeated, but we have another war to win. We must strive to preserve our way of life and guard it or we will lose it. We must not fail to realize our major problem—that of establishing a world peace organization. We shall need intelligence and education. Hard work will have to be abundantly used."

"The world organization will have to be maintained by hard work and sweat and perhaps with our lives. We accept this challenge tonight and we will not fail our trust."

Henry H. Hartley, superintendent of Nyssa schools, announced that a \$125 scholarship given by the Oregon state chapter of the P.E.O. sisterhood was awarded to Harriet Herrman. The scholarship was one

Q. What is meant by Veteran Employment Rights?

Ans. That any person who was inducted or entered the services of the armed forces of the United States in any manner after May 1, 1940, and who was released in any manner otherwise than without honor has certain specific rights for re-employment.

Q. What is set as the time limit under which the returning veteran must make application for the return to his former position to be sustained under the act?

Ans. Ninety days.

Q. On what agency must the veteran rely to sustain him in this act?

Ans. The Selective Service Agency. This body must take all possible means in securing the returning veteran all rights under this act, even to process of the courts if need be.

Q. Does this act cover all employment whether it is covered by Civil Service or in private employment in industry?

Ans. Yes the act covers all employment other than that which would be considered that of a temporary nature only.

Q. With whom should the returning Veteran register for employment? Should he not desire to return to his former position upon release from the armed forces?

Ans. The U.S.E.S. (United States Employment Service) which offices are mandated to give the Veteran preference and to secure for him employment if possible.
