



KNOW THE ANSWERS

Germany's mistake 20 years ago was that plans were made for destruction and not construction, declared W. M. Bartlett, state consulting engineer for the governor's committee on post-war readjustment and development, in an address at the capital this week. Little interest has been shown in long range planning in the past and it is a number one problem now. We should reverse the pattern Germany followed. Public works are not the answer to post-war problems. They are merely the tacking to be pulled out at any time industry and other productive agencies are able to take over, he said. In the overall type of program he suggested the inclusion of education, agriculture and recreation; with a balance of 50 per cent of the program social and the other half economic.

FOR FREE 21 MILLION

One Oregon state agency is now insured of a four-star rank in the post-war readjustment and rehabilitation campaign. When congress passed the roads and highways authority measure there was no "ifs and when appropriated" joker in the works.

The bill is a contract between the federal government and the sovereign states. The agreement with the state of Oregon is that the federal government will furnish the state's highway commission \$7,100,000 a year for each of the first three post-war years if the state will furnish \$4,800,000 for each of the three years. The state will spend \$14,700,000 and get \$36,000,000 in roads and highways. The proposition is like dad giving one of the boys a \$20 bill to buy himself a new \$35 suit.

WOOD WASTE UTILIZATION

The agricultural appropriation bill, which includes a \$227,520 fund for wood waste utilization research, has passed the senate and the house and has gone to the white house for the president's signature. This fund was sought by the entire Oregon delegation in congress and Governor Snell as a vital project for the state.
