Russia

Since the beginning of 1945 I saw a mid-Victorian rig, a horse and buggy, pass an automobile on a graded road. It was not a race. The car was not running. The motorist was out changing a tire. The driver of the rig sat up straight and pressed his horse for a bit of extra speed going by, which was funny. The car owner made the change and drove into town far ahead of the buggy.

Between 1928 and 1938 the United States, the world's outstanding industrial nation of all time, had an industrial depression. Meanwhile the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics was moving forward; not rapidly, but at an increasing rate. In those years it was being transformed from an agricultural to an industrial nation, a stage through which America had passed, half a century before.

A Wind-Broken Nag Russia was driving a horse named "Central Planning." The rig made an interesting dash for improvement; not very fast however, nor very spectacular. Claims made for the animal's speed were funny; certainly not all true. Living conditions in Russia were not as high as those in America in the pit of our depression; never have been before nor since. It was a splurge, better than Russia had before, but far below American achievement.

There is nothing new about Central Planning. It's as old as horse-drawn equipment. Kings, tyrants and dictators have always used the idea. Some have done better with it than others, depending on the ruler. Russia's recent rulers have been anything but stupid. Their military leadership has the world agog. Russia has made a marvelous advance, using American equipment extensively.

For National Safety

You would think that Russia, living next door to an armed desperado for 25 years could have adequately prepared for war. No; Central Planning couldn't do it. It took a raid on Pearl Harbor to wake America from a sweet dream of peace, but America went into action with Private Enterprise and, in four years, armed the United Nations for victory. This demonstrates which system is better for national safety.

But war is never America's main objective. We are a peace-loving people and want to work and prosper and live well. Some say that America, in view of Russia's achievements, ought to junk Free Enterprise and adopt Central Planning. Knowing that Russia's achievements have never compared to our own, the suggestion is preposterous. Let's examine the figures of an expert for a moment:

Development Compared Leopold Schwarzschild, in his recent book called "Primer of the Coming World," shows some index figures to make a fair comparison of industrial gains in similar periods—Russia, while at her best in 1928-38, and America in a similar period. Here are three for a sample:

U.S.S.R. U.S.A.	
Coal Mining	599 1,332
Railroad Building	38 918
Automobiles	129 2,066

The Russian government is an autocracy. One political party controls everything, including newspapers and radio, but not more than 2% of the people belong to it. . . . the upper class. Kick up a rumpus about it if you want to go to the salt mines and serve your country for insufficient board and clothes. The system overcomes unemployment, but wages are only one-sixth of wages in America and the standard of living only one-sixth as high. I am in favor of keeping Private Enterprise here.

Stuffed Franks Stretch Points A dinner in a jiffy—but good—is what you have when you serve stuffed frankfurters in this fast, easy way. They'll go down like hotcakes and the family will ask for a repeater.

Pluffy potatoes broiled in smiling franks will add their share to any meal—and save on those little red tokens so precious to all of us.

STUFFED FRANKS 8 frankfurters. Prepared mustard. 2 cups well-seasoned mashed potatoes. ¼ cup minced onion. 1 to 2 tablespoons chopped canned pimiento. ¼ cup chopped parsley.

Pour boiling water over frankfurters; cover; let stand eight minutes. Split lengthwise. Spread with mustard. Combine remaining ingredients; blend; stuff frankfurters with mixture. Brown lightly in broiler or oven. Serves eight.

MAY DAY DINNER: Stuffed franks, green asparagus spears, sliced tomatoes, ruby radishes with their fresh green tops, crisp salad bowl salad, crusty corn muffins and sponge cake squares topped with sugared berries.

GOOD BEET CARE IS URGED BY BENNING

Announcement of a 25 per cent

cut in sugar rations makes it imperative that sugar beet growers take the best possible care of the 1945 crop. It was pointed out by A. E. Benning, general agriculturalist of the Amalgamated Sugar company.

"With only 70 per cent as much available for rationing as in 1944, and the rationing allotment reduced from 20 to 15 pounds, growers have a patriotic duty to harvest a maximum crop of beets," Mr. Benning said.

The agriculture department of the sugar company through its fieldmen will offer every possible aid to growers to assist them in obtaining the maximum yield from their respective acreages, according to Mr. Benning.

Under OPA regulations farmers who grow sugar beets are entitled to 25 pounds for each member of his family unit without giving up a ration coupon.

SCHOLARSHIPS IN THERAPY OFFERED

How young men and women of Malheur county may prepare for careers in an uncrowded profession through free scholarships in physical therapy at leading universities and medical schools was described by Robert D. Lytle, chairman of the Malheur county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Some of the funds contributed by the residents of Malheur county in the March of Dimes will be used for the 1,267,000 nation-wide physical therapy training program. "While students who accept these free scholarships are under no obligation to specialize on infantile paralysis cases after graduation," said Mr. Lytle, "the national foundation feels that if it can overcome the acute shortage of trained physical therapists all over the country, this will be of great importance if there should be an epidemic of infantile paralysis here or in some other section."

The scholarships, of nine and 12 months duration, cover transportation to the medical school, tuition, books and laboratory fees and living expenses as needed. Applicants must have at least two years col-

lege training, with emphasis on biology and other sciences, or be graduates of accredited schools of nursing or physical education. Inquiries should be addressed directly to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, 120 Broadway, New York 5, N. Y. Mr. Lytle pointed out that there are today only 2500 qualified physical therapists in the United States, and more than half of them are in the armed forces. There is immediate need for at least 5000 more, with additional numbers to be required in the post-war application of physical therapy to a constantly expanding field of civilian practice and in the treatment of war casualties.

SHOWING CARD TO EMPLOYER URGED

With many returning servicemen entering the labor market for the first time, and with students getting jobs in the coming holidays, Vernon A. Welo, manager of the LaGrande office of the social security board advised all workers "to show their social security account card to every employer for whom they work."

This is essential to protect the worker's wage record, which is maintained under his name and number for his future monthly insurance benefits, Mr. Welo pointed out. For example, there are approximately 575,000 Smiths on the social security board's records and, therefore, there are approximately 575,000 accounts under the name of Smith. It is important that no two Smiths have the same number. In stressing this point of one number for a worker's lifetime, Welo pointed out that employers are required to report each worker's wages, under both his name and number to the government every three months. Then these wages are credited by the social security board on each worker's individual ledger sheet, under both his name and number.

For these reasons, Mr. Welo said all workers in industry and commerce should follow this advice: Show your card to every employer for whom you work.

Make sure that he copies both your name and number correctly so that your wages may be credited to your account. Hang onto your card. Don't lose it; but if you do lose it, get a

duplicate. Never get a different number. Two numbers may cause some loss of wage credits and consequently of benefits. If you have more than one number, go to the nearest office of the social security board and see which one you should keep. You need only one number throughout life.
