The Veteran's Friend

Do you know that Comrade Thompson is nursing a much swollen hand and that he assures me that it was not from using the mit as a battering ram?

That the next meeting of all Veteran Organizations are very important as they will all elect their officers for the coming year and we should all get out and elect the men that we can get behind and will prove the leadership that will assure the public that the Veterans in Malheur county are able and willing to take their allotted place among other organizations to do their part in promoting the best welfare of our county.

Q. What are the eligibility requirements for the Veteran to secure his Re-adjustment allowance under the act?

Ans. (Note I am going to answer this question in two parts. First, the eligibility for the Veteran Un-employed and next week for the Veteran who is self-employed.)

(A) Active military or naval service at any time after September 16, 1940, and prior to termination of World War II.

(B) Discharge or release from active service under conditions other than dishonorable.

(C) Active service of 90 days or more, unless discharged for in-

jury or disability incurred in service in line of duty.

(D) As to any week (a period of 7 consecutive calendar days) of unemployment for which allowance claimed.

(a) Must be residing in United States at time of claim.

(b) Must be completely unemployed having performed no service and received no wages, or if partially unemployed, in that service have been performed for less than a full work week, wages for the week must be less than the allowance plus \$3.

(c) Must be registered with and continue to report to the U.S.E.S. employment office in accordance with its regulations.

(d) Must be able to work and

be available for suitable work.

Failure to comply with requirement which is due to illness or disability which occurs after commencement of period of continuous unemployment will not render person ineligible.

Q. What is the amount of payment per week under this allowance?

Ans. The allowance for a week will be \$20 less that part of wages payable to the Veteran which is in excess of \$3.

Q. What is the maximum number of weeks which can be drawn?

Ans. Fifty-two weeks.
