Q. Must a veteran file his claim each week and will he receive his allowance payment for same under the re-adjustment allowance act?
 Ans. He must file the claim, and then report his earnings in substantiation each week, and allowance will be paid at intervals as prescribed by the laws of each state.

Q. What is meant by net earnings under the act?
 Ans. Net earnings from self-employment include total income less necessary expenses incurred in securing such income. Personal or family expenses are not deductible as expenses.

Q. When a veteran moves to another area within the state, or to another state, how can he continue his claim for allowance?
 Ans. He should report to the public employment office nearest his new address for instructions. (In most cases this will be the U. S. E. S.)

Q. Where should the veteran be referred for information and for filing claim for re-adjustment allowance?
 Ans. To the United States employment service nearest home.

Q. If a veteran is receiving an increased pension, or a subsistence allowance for educational purposes, is he eligible to receive re-adjustment allowance?
 Ans. No.

MANY ASKING FOR HOME TELEPHONES

"Many people who are waiting for telephone service have asked whether we will be able to serve them soon, now that the European war is finished," C. M. Robertson, manager of the Malheur Home Telephone company said today.

"This company has at the present time in excess of 125 applications for service, and we have been installing telephones when facilities became available in the order of their application."

"The end of the war in Europe means that the day is nearer, of course, when it will be possible to manufacture all kinds of telephone equipment. But now all of our country's energies must be turned immediately to the swift defeat of Japan."

"When manpower and materials become available for the unlimited manufacture of telephone instruments, until the wires between the subscriber's premises and the telephone office, and the central office equipment itself are available, obviously the telephone instrument can be of no use."

"After final victory reconversion of our manufacturing plants will be a different story. But not a short one."

"First the telephone factories will have to be reconverted to civilian production and then they must turn out huge quantities of telephone equipment. After that, all the needed telephones, central office equipment and outside plant equipment must be installed for the people waiting for service. It will be the biggest peacetime job that the telephone company has ever faced."

"It will take many months but

we'll do it as fast as humanly possible, for we don't like to keep people waiting for service."

AVOIDING DERRICK ACCIDENTS URGED

In a letter to Idaho Power company's farm customers, C. J. Strike, president and general manager, directs attention to the company's efforts to eliminate hay-derrick accidents and asks for the cooperation of farmers who have occasion to move derricks beneath or near high voltage lines.

"Each year there are numerous fatal or nearly fatal accidents to persons and animals, the result of hay derricks coming in contact with high voltage lines," Mr. Strike said. "In addition to loss of lives, the damage to property, and interruption of electric service, this situation has resulted in a financial loss and inconvenience to the people served on the lines of the Idaho Power company."

"The company, Strike said, has posted derricks in the rural areas which it serves with signs that caution farmers to level the boom, fasten both ends, and refrain from touching metal chains or wet ropes while moving a derrick near electric wires."

"In addition we have made personal contacts, written letters and utilized every facility at our command to advise hay-derrick owners in the safe method of moving derricks and to caution them on the hazards involved," Mr. Strike said.

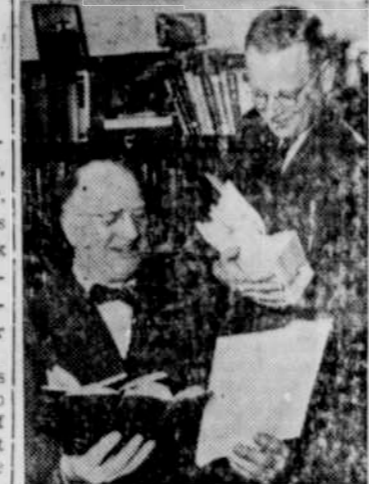
"If you will give the company's nearest office reasonable notice when you intend to move hay derricks or other equipment under power lines, we will, without charge send a representative to assist you in making the move safely."

"The company executive asked the farmers to join in an 'objective of making 1945 and subsequent years free from accidents in connection with the moving of hay derricks and other high equipment which could come in contact with high voltage wires.'"

Dr. J. Manning Potts, who came from Roanoke, Va., to become Bishop Magee's associate, presents him a summary of reports from the denomination's 600 district superintendents. The total is \$26,040,749. Of this amount 11 million is in cash, represented by pass books in the Bishop's hand. The rest is in pledges payable within the next nine months. This is believed to be the largest sum ever raised by a church for a comparable purpose.

Emphasis will now swing to other aspects of the four-year, five-fold Crusade for Christ: church school attendance, stewardship, evangelism and support of international collaboration.
