

1945 CANNING SUGAR ALLOTMENT IS CUT

In the wake of nation-wide tightening of sugar rationing OPA Regional Administrator Charles R. Baird issued an order limiting issuance of sugar for home canning purposes to 10 pounds per person, effective at once.

The order, designed to assure every consumer an equitable share of the curtailed 1945 sugar supply and prevent the possibility of complete suspension of home canning rations, will apply to California, Arizona, Nevada, Oregon, Washington and northern Idaho. Baird's order was accompanied by a statement in which he praised housewives in the Pacific region for their "patriotism and fair play in 1943 and 1944 in applying for home canning sugar rations," which he said, "allowed a fair and satisfactory distribution of supplies in those two

years." The regional order establishing the 10 pound limit also was at variance with emergency policies announced in the east and mid-west by OPA, where an avalanche of applications has tended to exhaust regional sugar allotments and already has resulted in a complete suspension of sugar issuances in many areas.

WEAPONLESS MAN WINS BRONZE MEDAL

WITH THE SEVENTH DIVISION MEDICAL BATTALION, OKINAWA.--A tall, quiet, sandy-haired G. I., whose religion forbids bearing arms, has won the bronze star medal and a reputation for bringing em back alive as a litter section leader in the medical corps, according to the United Press. Sgt. Ellis Points, 32, Route 5, Boise, Idaho, serves weaponless. "I know I am doing a noble work evacuating the helpless and Christ will protect me," he said. A veteran of Attu, Kwajalein, and Leyte, Points has never been wounded nor has any man in his section. His men have never failed

to bring all litter cases to safety. Points' latest exploit involved the rescue of eight casualties lying exposed to machine gun, sniper, and mortar fire on a ridge near Hill 178. Driven off in his first two attempts, Points realized he would have to dash across a 50-yard open space to reach his objective. He called for volunteers from the 32 litter bearers with him. The "job" started at 11 a. m. and was completed by nightfall. Nobody was scratched although the goup were under constant fire. Officers and men associated with Points attribute such exploits to the sergeant's personal courage and to an uncanny sixth sense which keeps him out of firing

range, but Points just says, "God was with us." Points is a member of the Followers of Christ church. He, his wife, Lillian, and their three-year-old son, Dale worship at a little church in Ustick, Idaho, under the pastorage of the Rev. George White.

This is the Situation on New Electric Appliances

For nearly four years, electric appliances have been made only for the armed services and for war workers' housing. A few now are coming on the market. In the next few months, there will be enough to meet critical civilian needs.

Electric Ranges and Floor Lamps were among the first to be authorized for manufacture. Electric Water Heaters are now available in some localities, but under restricted sale conditions. Some Washing Machines may be in stock by next Fall. Refrigerators are still scarcest of all large appliances, and probably will not be on the market until next year.

Most of these are pre-war, 1941 models. The new designs and models won't be out until--well, we hesitate to predict but it will be at least late 1946 before you can buy many of them.

So--it's still very wise to take good care of what you have, to call a service man before small troubles become major breakdowns. Until the war in the Pacific is nearer won, we'll all have to do with what we have.
