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PEACE TEST YET TO COME

Successful culmination of the San Francisco world peace conference by representatives of 50 nations marks a big step forward in the effort to establish and maintain world peace.

The world now has the machinery to enforce peace (and we say "enforce" peace advisedly), so if peace is not maintained it will be because some nations in the world prefer settlement of differences by war rather than peaceful means.

We had a league of nations after the first world war, but it was not a success, because it was not given a chance to work and this one will not be successful, if the people of the world do not work for its advancement.

Apparent settlement of the Polish problem by Russia, Poland, the United States and Britain is heartening because it is such problems that may cause an upset in the peace machinery. It is fairly easy to reach agreements on generalities, but the test of the world peace organization will come over just such incidents as the Polish problem. The strain will come when some nation has to make a sacrifice in order to maintain peace.
