A vote of 47 to 3 against the proposed Columbia Valley authority by representatives of water using groups at a meeting held in Caldwell Saturday is a rather convincing retort to the administrator of the Bonneville authority who recently charged that reclamation groups opposing CVA were only mouthpieces of power companies. We doubt if anyone in southwest Idaho seriously imagines these farmers represent any interest but their own, and it is encouraging to see them stand up and say what they think on this important subject, whatever their views may be.

For a section of our officialdom has come to look upon itself as the sole fountainhead of wisdom, to regard as impertinence any expression of opinion by the citizens themselves, who after all must pay the freight on these noble (?) experiments the bureaucrats think up. Expressions like the one at Caldwell, which are coming frequently these days, ought to sound a warning that administrators of federal projects are after all only servants of the people, not their masters.

The people of the northwest ought to have considerable to say about whether they are to abandon the methods by which the northwest has been developed to date for control by two or three administrators responsible to no one out here in the area supposed to be served, and in fact are resentful of any opinions but their own.

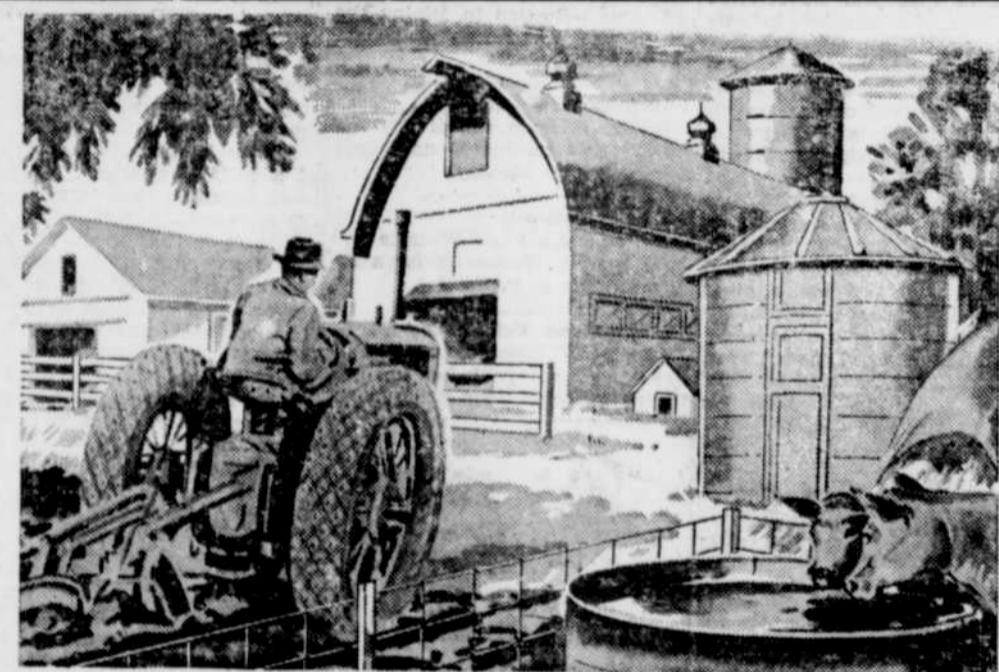
