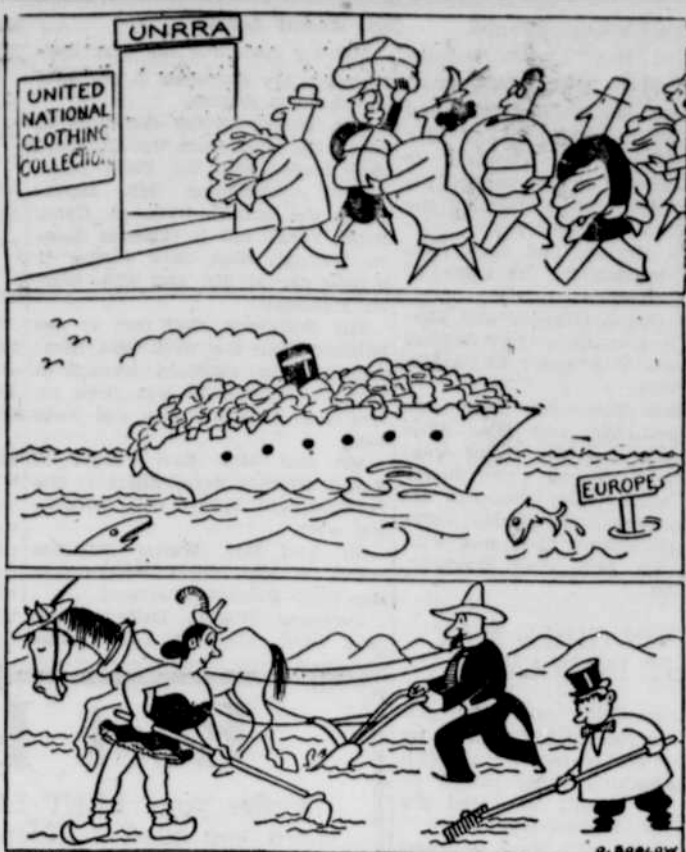

The Veteran's Friend

Do you know that your veterans service officer for the county has been appointed and that J. F. Morfitt, whose phone is 382R, Ontario, is available to assist with any problem that confronts the returning veteran or any member of a veterans family who may have such a problem? It is expected that the service officer will soon establish places where he can be contacted in all locations in the county and the schedule and places where he can be contacted will be announced in your papers in the near future. That the Disabled American Veterans of the county will hold their annual picnic the last Sunday in July at the Jim Carico ranch near the Gala gardens junction of highway 30 between Ontario and Fruitland, Idaho. All returned veterans, their families and any other veterans who wish to attend are invited. The D. A. V. will furnish coffee and ice cream and refreshments, so bring the sandwiches and salads and join with the D. A. V. on Sunday, July 28 at the Jim Carico place.

Q. Is there a pension for any widow of a veteran in all cases where the man served in the armed forces of the United States but who died after discharge from causes other than of service-connected disability?

Ans. Yes, there is such a pension. (It is desirous of your service officer that all widows of veterans of any war in the county contact him so that these cases in the county may be cleared up.)

Q. Does the government furnish grave markers for the graves of all veterans?

Ans. Yes, the government does furnish grave markers and your service officer can furnish you with blanks to make the application for same.

Q. Is the state of Oregon to make a loan to veterans of world war 2 similar to the one made to world war 1 veterans who entered the armed forces from this state.

Ans. Yes, there is to be a state loan and the machinery is now being set up to take application for this loan and there should be some announcement soon relative to this loan.

EXAMINATIONS SET FOR STATE JOBS

New examinations for clerical and casework personnel have been scheduled by the merit system council. The examinations date has been tentatively set for August 25. Examinations will include advanced and beginning clerical and stenographic series including administrative secretary, stock control clerk, and telephone caseworkers; beginning and advanced caseworkers, assistant casework supervisor, and casework supervisor with the state public welfare commission.

Vacancies exist in all covered agencies; state public welfare commission, state board of health, unemployment compensation commission, and the crippled children's division of the University of Oregon Medical school. Employment with these agencies offers permanent tenure, regulated compensation, paid vacations, sick leave and protected working conditions. As a career service it offers opportunities for inservice advancements. Retirement benefits as passed by the state

legislature include employees in the agencies covered by the merit system. Further, applicants qualifying now need not qualify again when the new state civil service law becomes effective.

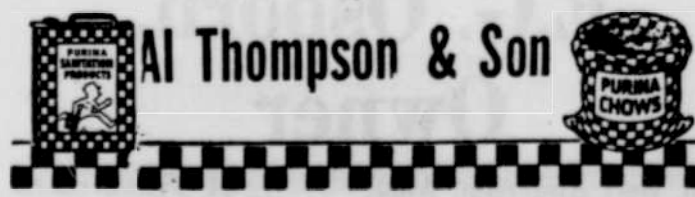
