Group at Vale Votes for PUD

county please stand".

Practically everyone in the crowd arose.

Placing the question of forming a PUD on the ballot entails the circulation of petitions. The number of petition signers must equal five per cent of the number of persons who voted for supreme court justice at the last general election.

That figure will be easy to reach, speakers pointed out, with the idea that the matter be presented to the people for a vote at the 1946 May primary.

The group then passed a motion providing that 10 men be selected on the sponsoring committee. Thirteen were nominated. They are LeRoy Herrman, C. S. Harris, Gordon Dixon, Neal Dawson, Walter White, E. F. McDole, Fred Berry, Clint Keeshing, Frank Parr, E. J. Williams, E. F. Bush, Bert Black and William Winnefred.

A motion was made that the number of committeemen be increased to 13 and the proposal was followed by an argument between State Senator Jim Jones and J. E. McClure of Vale over parliamentary procedure. The committee of 13 was finally accepted.

The meeting was then thrown open to general discussion, with Mr. Griggs again appearing for the opposition. He presented figures to show that Idaho Power company rates, based on 15 KWH, were much lower than those of certain municipal utilities and other governmental groups.

Jacobson interrupted Griggs to state that "I agree those rates are high. That is why we want a PUD. He finally let Griggs proceed, but added that "I think you got your figures from the wrong place".

Luther Fife of Nyssa asked several questions and expressed doubt whether a small business enterprise such as a PUD could take care of the residents of the county under all circumstances.

"If the power company rates are too high, why doesn't the public utilities commission make them lower the rates?" Fife asked.

Mr. Williams said the people have been willing to pay the high rates. C. S. Harris said the PUD rates would not be regulated by a government commission.

Earle Parker said the R. E. A. rates are on record. For 30 KWH the price is \$1.75.

Griggs then asked "Is the R. E. A. in the hole?"

Jacobson said "Yes, but if we had the density the Idaho Power company has----- We have gone out where the Idaho Power company would never go. We are operating at a loss, but the idea is

OPA REGULATION CHANGE IS SOUGHT

Operators of the Polar Cold Storage plant, owned by L. T. Marshall are circulating a petition for the purpose of obtaining a change in regulations by the office of price administration.

The petition requests that grading of producers' meat for their own consumption be rescinded. The orders and regulations, as they now stand, are interpreted by OPA to require grading of a farmer's own meat when he has the meat animal slaughtered for himself and the carcass temporarily in the possession of the locker plant by storage in the chill room. Likewise, when the locker plant processes the meat by cutting it, wrapping it, quick freezing it, and then putting it in the patron's individual locker box, OPA insists that the meat must bear a grade label.

Grading of meat which is to be sold is not objected to and Mr. Marshall said that the organized locker industry is willing to co-operate in the meat rationing program against violations of the price structure.

"The only reason for petitioning at this time is to enable the locker plants of the nation to stay in business, on a reasonable basis, continuing to serve the patrons in the conservation of their meat supply," Marshall said.

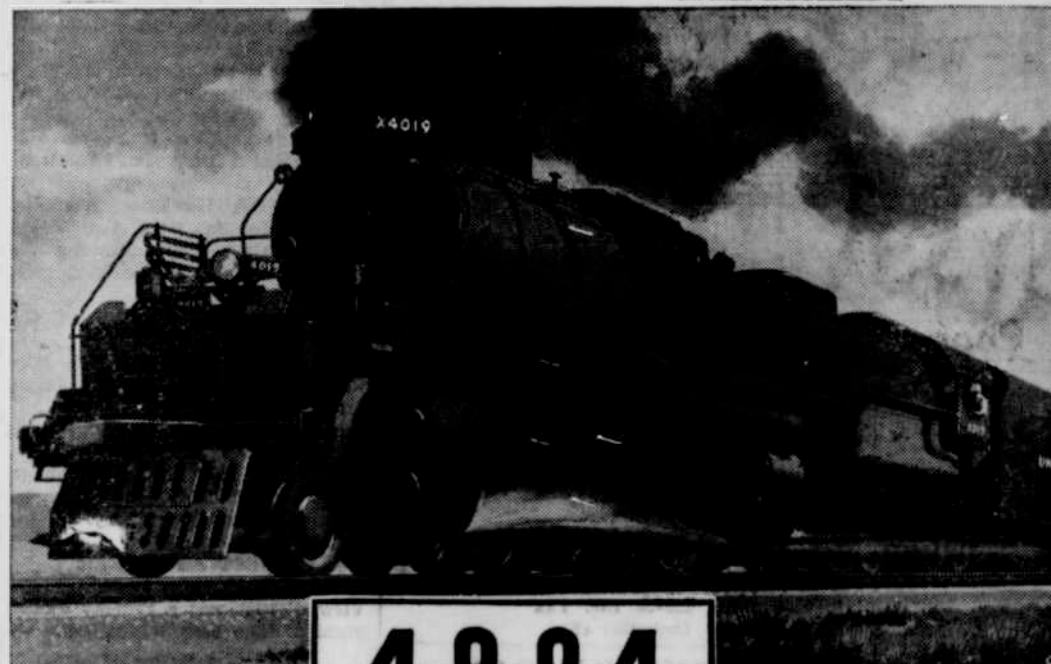

Railroaders identify various types of locomotives by the number and arrangement of wheels from front to rear.
