Suggestions To Game Body Given

Ted Berreth of Ontario, president of the Malheur Game league, and Bernard Frost of Nyssa have returned from Portland, where they presented to the Oregon state game commission the Malheur league's recommendations on hunting laws for the 1945 season. The Malheur league recommended

inclusion of a hen in the Chinese pheasant bag limit, but the commission rejected the suggestion on the grounds that there is not enough hens for the roosters for proper increases.

The local league also asked for an open season on sagehens in the southern part of the county during the antelope season, September 22 to 30. The commission promised to take a count of the birds, and if there are enough to warrant an open season shooting will be allowed next year.

The suggestion was made to the commission that the deer season be opened September 20, so that farmers could go deer hunting before they started harvesting beets, but the forest service opposed the plan because of the fire hazard in the early fall. The season will be open from September 29 to October 28. There will be no special doe deer tags issued except 800 tags for a post-season shoot to be held in the Fort Rock-Silver lake area from December 1 to 5, inclusive.

Eight hundred tags will be issued for the taking of antelope with ear-length horns. The season will be from September 22 to 30, inclusive.

The hearing held last Saturday was adjourned until July 28, at which time the final regulations will be passed.
