The Veteran's Friend

Do you know that on account of there being a circus in Ontario that the Disabled American War Veterans' picnic to have been held at the Jim Carico ranch will be postponed one week so it will be held Sunday, August 5? All veterans invited, so come on vets bring the sandwiches and join the sick, lame and lazy for a good time on Sunday, August 5. That Comrade Don Graham and Jessie have been showing the old broad smile as their son has been spending a furlough with them, and if we have missed Jessie at the office it was because she was enjoying the grandchildren. That Army Nurse Hinemoa E. Seifert was saying hello and good-bye before returning to Portland last week in Nyssa. Hinemoa advises that they are planning to return to make their home in Nyssa some time later. She is discharged from the service.

Q. What is the veteran's preference for new farm machinery and what is the procedure to receive the preference certificate?

A. The war production board has issued a directive that the returning world war 2 veteran is entitled to a preference certificate on all new farm machinery. This preference application is available at your service officer's office and they will be glad to assist with making out the application and explaining procedure of processing same.

Q. Is there any veterans preference on war surplus commodities in which the veteran may purchase such commodities?

Ans. Yes, there is a mode in which veterans may make application for the purchase of war commodities that are in surplus.

Q. Is there any provision for setting the veteran up in a new business under which he would come under the O. P. A. in respect to war rationed items?

Ans. Yes, there is a procedure in which the returning world war No. 2 veteran may receive issuance of rationed items for sale to set himself up in a business.

Q. Can a veteran returning to civilian enterprise secure stocks of automobile tires for re-sale.

Ans. Yes, there is a provision under which veterans of world war No. 2 can secure stocks of tires for re-sale.

This column is your service officer's medium of answering all questions that are bothering the returning veteran so if you have a question shoot them in for they may help some buddy who does not know his rights.

triangle 12 miles long on each side formed by Yellow Pine, the Cox ranch and Indian peak.

Searchers said they believed an air current in the treacherous country was responsible for the

crash. They said the plane was found not far from Caton lake and Indian peak, and that it probably crashed when Van Petten apparently swooped low over the lake, one of his favorite fishing spots, to take a quick look.

The smoke jumpers landed about one mile from the wreckage and several hours later reached the scene. A pack train wound its way toward the crash Saturday from the Cox ranch, about two airline miles distant, but six or seven miles away on the ground.

Yaggy and Johnson flew to within 150 feet of the crash scene and said it was "extremely difficult" to locate the plane.

The pilot was engaged by Mrs. Van Petten to make a special search flight for the craft, which was the object of other searches by the civil air patrol and army fliers since its disappearance.

Yaggy said he understood Black made a business of searching for lost planes and persons on his "own hook" and added he thought that if a reward is made, Black should get it.

"We'd been over the area a hundred times and had practically abandoned the search from the air when Black came up," he said.

"He didn't make any wild claims and said if the wind wasn't right his dogs might not pick up the scent, but that there were good chances that they would."

On the afternoon of May 27 Van Petten, Flegel and Van Petten's young son left Ontario for Yellow Pine where the boy was to spend the summer on a ranch. The plane landed safely and the two men saw that the boy reached the ranch and then took off for home at about 5 p. m.

At one time the Van Petten family offered a \$1500 reward for a certain period in hopes someone would make a special effort to find the plane. When that was withdrawn a standing reward of \$500 was offered and relatives in Ontario said the money would be given to whoever it was decided had the biggest part in making the discovery.

Mrs. Frank Van Petten and Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Van Petten went to McCall to keep close check on the progress of the pack train.
