Prisoners Are Treated Well

them would like to remain in this country, but, of course, that is impossible.

The camp is rationed food three times a week from Gowen field. The rations are based on 3700 calories a day. The Germans know their relatives in Germany are getting only 1000 calories a day, which is not sufficient for a working person. Germans are big bread eaters and each of the prisoners at the camp eats a loaf of bread daily. The prisoners have meat at least twice a day and sometimes three times. They have oranges, cantaloupes, celery and other food of that type as well as the ordinary staple food.

In cases of minor illness and injuries the prisoners are given treatment in the first aid station at the camp, but when the men are in serious condition they are taken to the hospital at Gowen field at Boise.

About 10 per cent of the prisoners speak and read English. They receive reading matter, such as magazines and newspapers.

Each day the prison camp laborers are assigned a task in the field, which is equivalent of about half or three-fourths of what free labor would do. They are required to finish the task regardless of whether it takes them 10 hours or 16 hours.

On one particular day last week the Germans worked as follows: 240 hoeing beets, nine hoeing onions, 74 picking potatoes, nine hoeing corn, 100 thinning apples, four hoeing beans, and 19 cleaning ditches.

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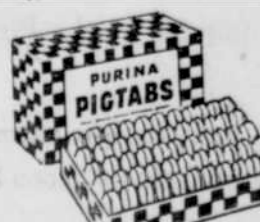


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
