FARM PRICES TOP PARITY BUT WAGE RATES ARE HIGHER

The United States general level of prices being received by farms is approximately 19 per cent above "parity," with farm wage rates omitted from the formula, according to the weekly review of farm market, price and outlook information prepared by the extension service at O. S. C. The picture is quite different, however, when farm wage rates are considered in addition to commodities farmers buy, taxes and interest. The national index shows farm wages 200 per cent higher than

the 1935-1939 average, while the figures for Oregon indicate 325 per cent above that average. In sharp contrast the national index of prices paid by farmers for commodities, interest and taxes is only 35 per cent above the 1935-1939 level.

As of July 1, farm wage rates in Oregon and generally throughout the nation were 10 per cent higher than a year ago. The national average increase in the index of prices paid for commodities, interest and taxes was only about two per cent over a year ago. The combination of wage rates and other costs practically offsets average advance of seven per cent above a year ago in the general level of prices received by farmers.

At mid-June this year United States average farm prices for some of the farm products produced in Oregon were as follows in relation to "parity," as now calculated: Wheat 98 per cent, oats 98, barley 91, hay 77, potatoes 144, hogs 112, beef cattle 138, veal calves 118, lambs 132, wool 132, milk cows 137, butterfat 120, milk at wholesale 123, turkeys 134, chickens 140, eggs 112, horses 28 alfalfa seed 165, red clover seed 107, alsike clover seed 121, apples 163.

Parity prices are being figured for 165 different farm products.

POSSIBLE SPREAD OF MOTH PROBED

Efforts to keep the oriental fruit moth, an extremely harmful pest which has caused huge losses in California, from spreading into Oregon, were emphasized by Hugh Taylor of the Oregon state department of agriculture, formerly state inspector in this area, when he visited Malheur county last week.

This program is especially pertinent here for the reason that the oriental fruit moth has been found in orchards in Canyon and Owyhee counties, just across the Idaho line. Normally a considerable amount of fresh fruit is obtained in those counties by Malheur county residents and some nursery stock is brought here from Idaho. This may still be done, if the fruit and nursery stock are fumigated in the manner directed by the Oregon department of agriculture.

Methyl bromide is required for fruit, nursery stock and cuttings, and also for used containers which may be brought into Oregon from either of those neighboring Idaho counties.

Certificates issued by duly authorized officials affirming that the orders originated outside the infested area, or have been fumigated in accordance with the order, are necessary for importation of fruits, nursery stock or used containers into Oregon.
