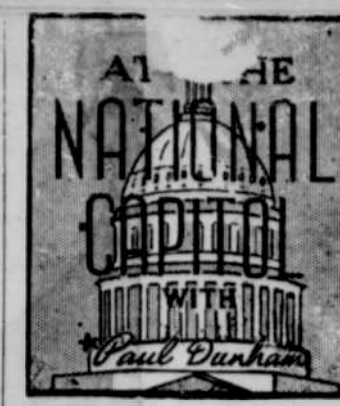

Washington, D. C., August, 9—

DESPITE the fact that the contribution by the United States to the United Nations relief and rehabilitation fund is approximately 74 per cent of the total, and each of the 44 signatory nations agreed to put up one per cent of its national income, UNRRA is already preparing a request to congress for an additional appropriation, even though its work in the devastated countries has scarcely begun. The first appropriation by congress to the UNRRA fund was \$450,000,000 and there was an additional transfer of \$350,000,000 worth of lend-lease supplies on certification by the joint chiefs of staff which has been approved by congress. The total amount for which the United States is obligated is \$1,350,000,000.

Representative Dirksen of Illinois insist that the relief work of UNRRA to date does not justify further appropriations at this time and that an investigation of its activities is imperative. The organization is headed by former Governor Lehman of New York. In Mr. Dirksen's opinion, UNRRA is over-manned, has been extravagant and evidence of poor business judgment are so numerous as to warrant the belief that a complete overhaul is necessary to prevent further waste. Purchases by UNRRA have been at prices out of proportion to market values, the Illinois congressman said, and the general attitude of its agents abroad is one of contempt for the authority of congress to supervise its expenditures.

One report by an agent of UNRRA who resigned because he could no longer countenance the methods employed, declared that there was a power-politics fight between England and Russia in Europe in which the United States is expected to foot the bill. He also asserted that in the foreign offices of UNRRA the personnel is so large that many have nothing to do and that the United States "is being taken for a ride." He protested against being compelled to don a British uniform when sent into a British occupation zone, even to bedroll and mess kit, giving the people the impression that the relief was coming from Great Britain alone.

Representative Dirksen declared that there are UNRRA employees in Ethiopia, that UNRRA food supplies appear in the black market in Athens, that tractors are being flown to the Balkans in American planes by American aviators while American farmers are unable to buy them, and that it is reported UNRRA members are carrying on black market operations in gold sovereigns between Egypt and Italy.

REPRESENTATIVE DeLacy of Washington, Representative Sabbath of Illinois and other members of the house have been building a back-fire against the freely bandied charges of communist activity in the United States by calling attention to the fact that the chief investigator for the committee probing subversive activities is the attorney for an alleged Nazi and fascist organization, including Father Coughlin and Wilhelm Ludecke, the latter an accredited representative of Hitler in the United States, according to Mr. DeLacy. Mr. Sabbath followed by naming 40 individuals, 27 organizations and 10 publications openly working for or in sympathy with the Nazis and demanded an investigation. Some of them have been indicted and convicted, he said, "but are still permitted to undermine and weaken our government in its efforts to effect a successful ending of the Asiatic war and in every way possible to create disunity among the United Nations."

RECENT statement by war food administration that parcels of food are not permitted to be shipped out of the United States without the giving up of ration points does not satisfy Representative Latham of New York, and he called attention to a full page advertisement in which a New York department store offered to mail packages of food to any place in the world in unlimited quantities and without requiring points. These packages, Mr. Latham insisted, contain butter, sugar and meat, for some of which points are furnished by OPA. The shipments have now reached enormous proportions, he said, and are contributing to the scarcity of such food articles in the United States.

While the shipments are supposed to relieve the distress of individuals there is reason to believe they are finding their way into the black markets abroad. He was, he

said, "perfectly willing to share what we have with our needy European friends, but I cannot condone these uncontrolled, unlimited shipments of butter, sugar and meat point free and irrespective of need." He demanded that the newly appointed secretary of agriculture take immediate steps to stop the practice.
