### First National Is 80 Years Old

Eighty years ago, just after the close of the civil war, five Oregon pioneers received their charter for the First National bank of Portland. The date was September 8, 1865.

The infant bank was capitalized at \$100,000. Capital funds now total \$20,000,000.

"Through the trying period following the civil war, through the monetary panics of 1893 and 1907, the Spanish-American war, world war 1 and world war 2, not to mention the prosperous times of peace between these conflicts, the First National bank has grown with Oregon and extended its influence in the civic and business life of the city and state," bank officials said.

"Since that early day before any bridges spanned the Willamette river in Portland, the bank has grown to be one of the nation's leading institutions with resources of \$485,000,000 and a statewide system of modern banking service through its 40 branches and eight affiliated banks throughout Oregon.

"During the first week of operation of the bank at No. 79 Front street in Portland, five loans were made totaling \$1,800. Its loans today total over \$50,000,000.

"Since 1910, the First National has issued no new stock. The only stock put on the market in recent years has been that sold from large holdings. First stockholders were A. M. Starr, Henry W. Eddy, Alexander P. Ankeny, Lewis M. Starr and Phillip Wasserman. On page four of the original minute book of the corporation are the minutes showing that these stockholders held a meeting on July 4, 1865, and organized by electing A. M. Starr chairman and Amory Holbrook, clerk.

They then proceeded and elected themselves directors. Addison Starr was elected the first president and Amory Holbrook cashier."

On June 1, 1932, C. F. Adams, elected as president in 1927, was named chairman of the board of directors and E. B. MacNaughton, was elected president of the bank.

Present directors of the First National bank are: Burt Brown Barker, Mason L. Bingham, H. P. Cabell, Ben R. Chandler, Carlos C. Close, E. Franz, A. P. Giannini, Wm. A. Haseltine, L. H. Hoffman, G. C. Lorenz, J. H. Mackie, E. B. MacNaughton, Paul Neils, V. V. Pendergrass, W. J. Seufert, Carl F. Wente, M. C. Woodard and Thomas W. Young.

"We are proud of the record of our bank during the war," stated President MacNaughton, "363 of our men and women have been in the armed forces of our country serving in all the theaters of action. Of this number three have lost their lives. To date only 32 have been discharged to return to their positions with the First National but we are planning on a great many more of them being able to return in the near future. We have positions waiting for all of them as soon as they return."

"A total of over one hundred thirty million dollars worth of Series E, F, and G War bonds were sold over the counters of the First National bank and its branches throughout the state. Many hundreds of thousands of ration banking items went through our bank operations during the period of the war and will continue to be handled until such time as all rationing activity is suspended."

The bank president is enthusiastic about the expanded loan program designed to meet the needs of business for capital financing in this reconversion period. He states that special emphasis is now being placed on term loans to small businesses and the bank's facilities are being broadened to handle consumer credit on purchase of long awaited automobiles, farm machinery and household appliances.

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
