UPON THE ORGANIZATION OF NYSSA ROAD ASSESSMENT DISTRICT.

NOTICE HEREBY IS GIVEN, that upon a petition of 25 and more owners of land lying in a contiguous body, being filed with the County Court, proposing the organization of a road assessment district under the provisions of Chapter 96, Oregon Laws 1945, and after hearing on said petition, and no person appearing to object to the boundaries of such district as proposed, or the inclusion of any lands therein, and by order of the County Court of Malheur County, Oregon, duly made and entered in its journal, the County Court has called and there will be held within the boundaries of the proposed district, an election upon the question of whether or not such district shall be organized. Such election will be held at the Oregon Trail School Building in said proposed district, on the 13th day of October 1945, between the hours of 9 o'clock A. M. and 6 o'clock P. M. of said day.

At said election only resident owners of real property within the district as shown by the last county assessment on which he or she is liable or subject to pay a tax and who has resided within the boundaries of the proposed district for more than thirty days immediately prior to the time of the election, shall be entitled to vote.

At said election there shall be elected three directors whose terms shall expire in one, two and three years respectively, from the first Monday in July next succeeding their election, and their respective

term shall be decided by lot.

Nominations for the three directors shall be made by petition, signed by at least 10 qualified electors within the proposed district, which nominating petition shall be filed with the County Clerk at least 10 days prior to the time of the election.

The ballots to be used at said election will contain a blank line thereon for the voter to write in the name of any candidate voted for.

Weiser Defeats Nyssa Gridmen

line. The teams battled in the middle of the field until Weiser recovered a fumble. On the next play Chadwick went over for a touchdown as Kawasaki tackled him on the line. Weiser failed to convert, but both teams were offside and on the second attempt Herd carried the ball through the line for the extra point, making the count 7 to 0.

Nyssa received the ball and Low returned it to the Nyssa 35-yard line. With the count second down and 5 1/2 yards to go and two minutes to play, Nyssa failed on a pass. Weiser began running in the Weiser 45 for first and 10 and Kawasaki gained 8 yards. On the next play Yaguchi passed to Moore, who raced to the goal line. Kawasaki plunged the line for the extra point, making the score 7 to 7.

Weiser received at the opening of the second half and returned the ball to the Wolverine 45. Chadwick gained to the Nyssa 45 and Herd went through the entire Nyssa team and crossed the goal line standing up. The officials ruled the touchdown, because of a Weiser man holding. The Wolverines were not to be denied, however, and after a concerted drive reached the Nyssa 29. Toombs recovered a fumble on the 35, Low made three yards and Moore kicked only 20 yards. Wilder brought Maxwell down on the Nyssa 12. Maxwell gained to the five yard mark and Clabby threw a touchdown pass to Emert, who crossed the line standing up. Another Clabby-Emert pass accounted for the extra point.

Early in the third period Herd was injured and was taken from the game.

The last quarter consisted mostly of line plunging near the center of the field.

The starting lineups were as follows: Weiser—Emert and Hopkins, ends; Parker and Adams, guards; Hill and Bob Garner, tackles; Hamilton, center; Coppedge, quarter; Maxwell, fullback; and Clabby and Chadwick, halfbacks; and Nyssa—Moore and Billings, ends; Rookstool and Bellon, tackles; Church and Dimmick, guards; Kawasaki, quarter; Yaguchi, fullback, and Low and Wilder halfbacks.

STATE FUNCTIONS RESTORED

The untangling of federal strings on state activities the past week has eased progress in several state departments. Momentum was given this procedure by President Truman's agreement with the executive committee of the national governor's conference when they called at the White House ten days ago with a proposal that employment services be returned to the states.

The unemployment services of the 48 states were consolidated into the United States employment service in January, 1942, as a wartime measure.

W. W. II—VETERANS AID

On October 1, the state department of veteran's affairs will be ready to accept applications for loans from veterans of World War II who have at least 90 days service and are honorably discharged. Director Hugh Ross has just announced. The loans are for purchasing homes or farms on a 20-year payment plan at 4 percent interest. Loans will be held at \$3000 and will be made on 75 percent of the assessed valuation. Applicants must have been residents of Oregon at the time of their enlistment and when the apply for the loan. Servicemen assigned to the Specialized Training program are eligible. The department has called for bids on \$1,000,000 in bonds to finance the state Veteran's affairs department. Bids must represent 95 percent or more of the face value of the bonds.

TO AID CITIES

Several Oregon cities including Portland, Salem, Eugene and West Salem have been assured by the state highway commission that they will be extended full cooperation in planning arterial highways connected to the different cities. No agreement has been made as to when the work will start but coordination of effort is assured.

The highway commission has authorized the purchase of a series of wayside strips on the Pacific highway in Douglas county; on the Oregon coast highway between Waldport and Yachats; 635 acres on the Dalles-California highway between Bend and Redmond, to preserve juniper trees and 80 acres at the entrance to Silver Creek Falls state park.

GOVERNOR ISSUES APPEAL

Governor Earl Snell has issued a public request to the people of the state to aid in field and orchard harvests. "In the interest of those millions still in the armed forces and the civilian populations both at home and abroad we should conserve as much of the fruits of Oregon's productivity as is humanly possible—Call your local labor office and volunteer services." Growers of beans, hops, pears, peaches and other products are undergoing losses from the shortage of pickers.

In answering the appeal of the growers the governor was joined by Congressman Mott in requesting General George C. Marshall, chief of staff of the United States army, to supply German prisoners of war to go into the fields. General Marshall immediately wired the governor that 976 prisoners were on their way from Camp Adair to be followed by 500 from Ft. Lewis and that they will be available until completion of the harvest. Even with this help the shortage is still acute. In 12 field and orchard work gangs not one former shipyard worker was found. When a hopgrower near Camp Adair asked Maj. Gen. Mallon for 200 enlisted men to save his crop not only 200 men but over 400 volunteered. The grower paid out over \$900 that afternoon in wages.

FIREFIGHTER KILLED

Fatalities caused by the gigantic Tillamook forest fires increased to five last week when William Thomas, 53, of Seaside died at an Astoria hospital. A falling snag hit Thomas while he was fighting forest fire 20 miles north of Tillamook. Two of the Tillamook fatalities were caused by falling snags, one by a rolling boulder and two when a truck left the road and turned over.

HIGHWAY TRAFFIC UP

Traffic volume on Oregon highways has increased 26 percent since gas rationing has ended, at the close of the war, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrel, Jr. states. Traffic recorders maintained by the state highway commission counted 36,978 vehicles during the week ending August 18, compared with 29,331 the previous week.
