ATHLETIC FACILITIES NEEDED

The absence of facilities, such as a grandstand, at the Nyssa football field emphasizes the need of better accommodations for sports fans at Nyssa athletic contests.

The present football field and baseball diamond can probably be used satisfactorily for many years, without any need for changing their location, but seats should be provided for the spectators. The average adult cannot be expected to attend football and baseball games when he is required to either sit in his car behind other spectators or lounge around on the ground with the wind blowing a gale of dust into his eyes.

Better accommodations for sports fans and the players will most certainly increase interest in high school athletics. If finances cannot be raised by the school district or from other sources, perhaps some community field, such as the proposed Owyhee Riding club's rodeo grounds could be used. A complete recreation center, with all residents of the community interested would be the best solution of the problem.

One bad feature of an increase in interest in high school athletics is the demand on the part of sports fans for victories regardless of consequences. The most favorable feature of athletics in Nyssa for many years has been the attitude of local townspeople toward their teams. Our coaches have been more interested in the welfare and development of the boys than they have been in victories and the people have been satisfied with that policy. A decided increase in interest could cause a demand for athletic victories, but that can probably be controlled to a large extent by the spectators.

Plans of the school board for its post-war construction program include erection of a suitable gymnasium for basketball and other indoor sports. If sufficient seating capacity is provided, that plan will take care of the winter sports program very nicely. We will still have the spring, and fall sports problem to solve.

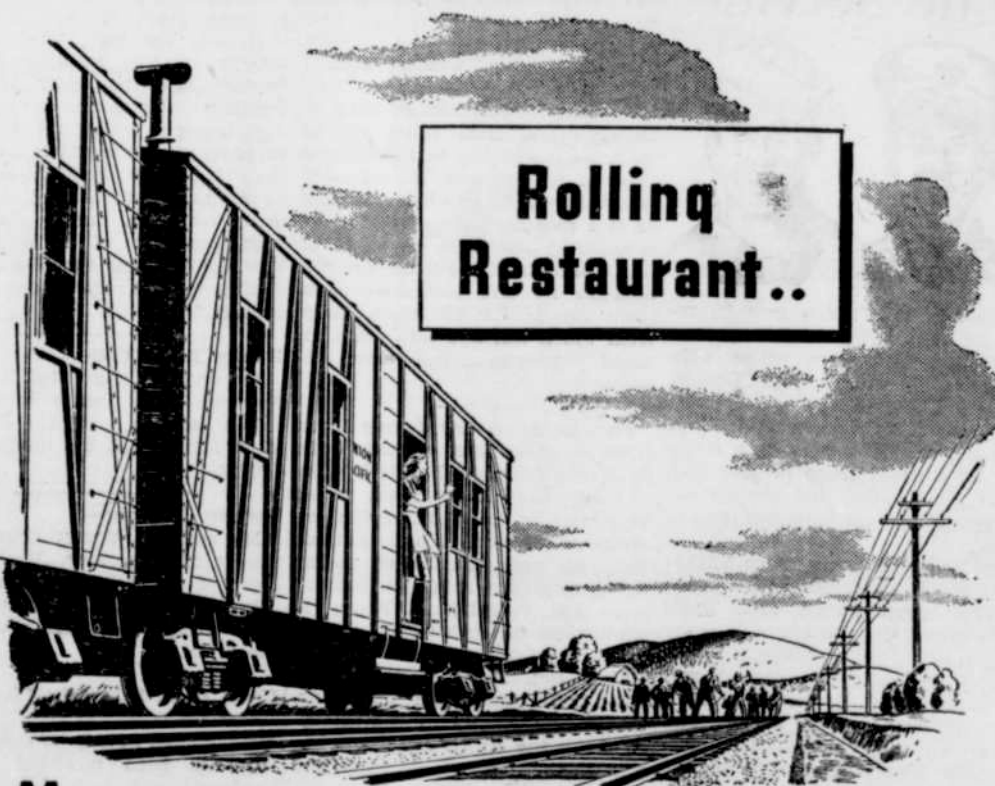
