the ball to the 15 yard line, then Ontario intercepted a pass which stopped Nyssa's charge. Ontario punted. Kawasaki made the catch. A line smash by Herren made more gains and Moore kicked the ball deep into Ontario territory.

Ontario made a lot of yardage on a series of short passes, but lost the ball. Then Kawasaki tossed the pass to Billings for the first score.

Nyssa punted, Ontario fumbled the ball and Nyssa downed it. Nyssa made yardage on a series of line smashes with Low totting the ball. Kawasaki flipped another nice pass to Low for more gains.

At the half, Henly, Ontario, kicked off, Moore received on Nyssa's 40. Low made more yardage and was

pulled out of the game on his second injury. Ontario punted. Herren received the ball and went twenty yards for more gains. Kawasaki received a head injury when attempting an end run, but much to the crowd's relief was able to stay in the game.

Nyssa kicked the ball, and Henly plunged to the 50-yard line. The Bulldogs received the ball on downs.

The Bulldogs pushed ahead 40 yards on a sensational three lateral end run. Moore went over for another touchdown but the referee ruled it void. Nyssa fumbled the ball and Ontario took it on its own 40-yard line. Kawasaki intercepted a pass which gave Nyssa the ball. Slippery Don Herren, made more gains for Nyssa. Yaguchi scored the second touchdown after Moore smashed through to about Ontario's 5 yard line.

The starting lineup was as follows:
Moore and Mitts, ends; Toombs, center; Dimmick and Church, guards; Rookstool and Bellon, tackles; Yaguchi, fullback; Kawasaki, quarterback; Herren, right halfback; and Low, left halfback.

AAA NEWS

Dairy Payments Due

Dairy production payments for the July, August and September period will be made by county AAA offices during October. Producers may file applications as soon as September sales slips are complete for the payment of 55 cents a hundredweight on whole milk and 13 cents a pound on butterfat.

On October 1, the payment rates went up to 70 cents for whole milk and 17 cents for butterfat. These rates will be in effect through March, 1946. Payments on production from October through December will be made in January.

Beef Payment Date Extended

The closing date for beef production has been extended for one month. Producers and feeders now have until October 31 to make application at county AAA offices for payments on sales made since the start of the program through August 31. On sales since September 1, applications for the 50 cents a hundred payment will have to be filed within 60 days.

Set-Aside Order On Turkey Off

The USDA has terminated its set-aside order on turkeys in Oregon and other states for government procurement was put into effect to obtain an adequate supply to provide traditional holiday dinners for the men and women of the armed services. The nation's turkey producers have a record crop ready for the holiday season which is expected to be adequate to meet demands of both the armed forces and civilians for the holiday season.

Wallace Points Out Importance Of Jobs

Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace, who served as secretary of agriculture from 1933 to 1940—says that with full employment after the war, the average person will eat 96 pounds of pork products a year compared with 67 pounds in the years before the war; 25 pounds of chicken compared with 16 pounds; 75 pounds of oranges compared with 49 pounds; 38 per cent more canned vegetables; 12 per cent more dairy products; and 17 per cent more eggs.

However, if 10 million peoples are unemployed after the war, he says that the net income of the average farmer would be sliced in half and 15 million unemployed people would cut the net income of agriculture to one-fourth of what it was in 1944. In his new book, "Sixty Million Jobs," Mr. Wallace points out that farmers would prefer to cooperate with industry for all-out production of industrial and farm products rather than to cooperate among themselves to match a scarcity program of industry.

ADDITION IS MADE TO MAYTAG STOCK

Addition of an automatic type washer, an automatic clothes drier, both gas and electric, a gas range and an electric frozen food locker to the Maytag line of household appliances was revealed to the Nyssa Furniture company, Maytag dealer, in a letter received today from President Fred Maytag, II.

The new products will be added to the line of conventional type washers and ironers produced by the 50-year old company, which manufactured and sold more than 4,000,000 washers before converting to war production in 1942.

No date has been announced as to when the new products will be made available to the public, although President Maytag expressed an opinion that the gas range and the frozen food locker would be on the market about the first of the year. No date has been revealed when the automatic washers and driers will be ready for distribution.

Samples of postwar models of Maytag conventional type washers have just been released to each of the more than 7,000 dealers representing the company throughout the United States was made after V-J day on reconversion and assembled machines were stock-piled until enough had accumulated for simultaneous shipment to all dealers.
