Kitchen Chats

The homemakers dream! A sweet without sugar! Home economists throughout the nation have put their heads together and produced dozens of tried and tested recipes to keep us from scraping bottom in our sugar bowl. The sugar has not been mentioned as being one of those off-the-ration list soon foods and we are therefore searching for new ideas. Honey and corn syrup are old stand-bys for substitutes, so today let's use honey.

"HONEY WALNUT BARS"
1 cup honey
3 eggs, well beaten
1 tsp baking powder
1-1/3 cups flour
3/4 cup chopped nuts
1-1/2 cup raisins
1 tsp vanilla extract
1/8 tsp salt

Blend the 1/3 cup of flour with chopped nuts and raisins. Beat honey and well-beaten eggs together. Sift together baking powder, salt, and flour and add to first mixture. Add raisins and chopped nuts that have been mixed with the flour. Add extract and blend. Bake in a flat pan, well greased. Mixture should be 1/4 inch deep after baking. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes and cut into strips 1/2 inch wide and 3 inches long.
