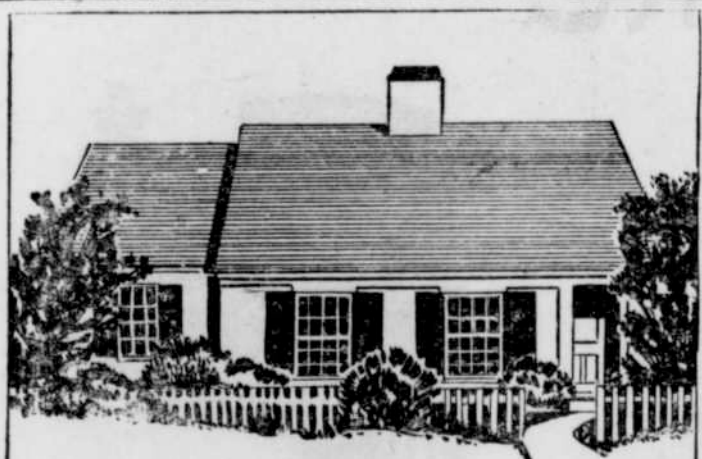

Ansel S. Rookstool, who is with the international air force, has arrived in Niagara, New York. He expects to visit in Nebraska before coming to Nyssa. He has been stationed in England for the last two and one-half years.

Sgt. Dale Dorman returned Thursday from Camp Maxie, Texas for a 10-day delay route furlough to Austin, Texas, where he has been transferred to the second infantry division.

Sgt. Raymond Larson has written his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Larson, that he has reached Japan by way of the Philippine Islands. He was sent to Cebu, then back to Japan. He is with the 97th division that is occupying the country about 50 miles north and west of Tokyo.

The war department has notified Joe Santillanes that his son, Pvt. Valentine Santillanes, a prisoner of the Japanese for four years, was liberated in September and is in fair condition. Pvt. Santillanes sent a message to his father saying, "Dad, I am in good health and happy to be a free man again. Will be home soon. Mr. Santillanes and another son left for Gallup, New Mexico to visit Pvt. Santillanes, who will be in a hospital for several weeks.

In keeping with the policy of the army air forces to discharge as rapidly as possible, men desiring separation from the service, Sgt. Claude J. Rookstool of route 2, Nyssa, Oregon, son of Mr. and Mrs.

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Portland army air base announced. Rookstool served for three years. Having spent 16 months overseas with the 8th air force in the European theatre of operations, Rookstool received the distinguished unit citation and ETO ribbon with seven battle stars.

He will return to Nyssa before resuming his former occupation of mechanic.

Fort Worth, Tex., Oct. 10.—Major Edgar B. Cole of Nyssa, Oregon, a veteran of the 8th air force, has been assigned to Lt. Gen. Barton K. Yount's AAF training command headquarters here as a liaison officer in the personnel division.

Before going overseas as a pilot, Major Cole was stationed at Santa Monica, California, and Hendricks, Field, Florida. He served with the 8th air force for five months and holds the purple heart, the air medal, the distinguished flying cross and the European theater ribbon with one star.

Before entering the armed forces early in 1941, he was an engineer with the Amalgamated Sugar company, Ogden, Utah. He was a graduate from the University of California at Berkeley in 1939.

## V-5 PROGRAM IS OPEN TO YOUTHS

Enlistees will be sent to college November 1 for about one year's schooling before starting flight training. It is anticipated that enlistments for this class will close about mid-October.

## EFFICIENT FARM OPERATION URGED

Efficient farm operation through better management, completing postponed farm improvements, and replacing worn-out machinery and unprofitable livestock are major reconversion goals of the Malheur county farm security program, announced Rosel H. Hunter, senior FSA supervisor, Wilson building, Ontario.

"Postwar adjustments as farm prices reach a more normal level, returning veterans and war workers are absorbed on farms, and competition for farm markets increases will make efficient production particularly important on family-type farms, in the opinion of the county FSA committee," said Hunter. "To meet these changes, farm improvements and replacements to put the farm on the best operating basis possible are considered essential."

FSA loans to present borrowers as well as new farmers in the

county will stress farm management practices for sound operation, adequate machinery, better livestock, and farm improvements. Improvements most needed in the county include farm and home building improvements, farmstead water facilities and fencing.

Farmers unable to secure adequate credit service to start farming operations or adjust their present operations to post-war conditions may advise with the following county FSA committeemen: Fred Burgess, Vale; David Mitchell, Nyssa, or Jess Rich, Ontario, or secure information at the county FSA office on Tuesdays and Thursday afternoons, the supervisor's office days.
