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WE MUST CO-OPERATE

Nyssa is on the verge of an industrial development that will increase the population of this community considerably within the next few years.

The industrial development will increase the number of wholesale and retail firms operating here and will thus give Nyssa greater attraction as a shopping center for our own people.

Our industrial development will be based largely on agriculture, thus tying the interests of the town people and rural folk even closer than they are now. The development is going to require a lot of co-operation between the two sections of our community. More so than in other sections, our town and rural children fraternize continually because our school district extends so far into the country. As a result we have a lot in common in our youngsters.

The people of the country and town also have a common interest in our agriculture. The remark has grown threadbare by repetition, but the truth still remains that what helps the farmers helps the city folk and what helps the town residents helps the producer.

Industrial development will increase the trade of the business firms and will increase the marketing possibilities of the farmers because the type of manufacturers that will be attracted to this section will use farm products as raw materials. The Nyssa chamber of commerce is already working with local dairymen in an effort to locate a factory here for the manufacture of milk products. The Idaho Canning company, which will require sweet corn for its operations, will locate a plant here next year.

Several other business firms anticipate locating in Nyssa as soon as buildings can be constructed. Nyssa is attracting attention at outside points because of the tremendous possibilities of development. To take advantage of this situation we must co-operate to the fullest possible extent. There should be no division of effort.

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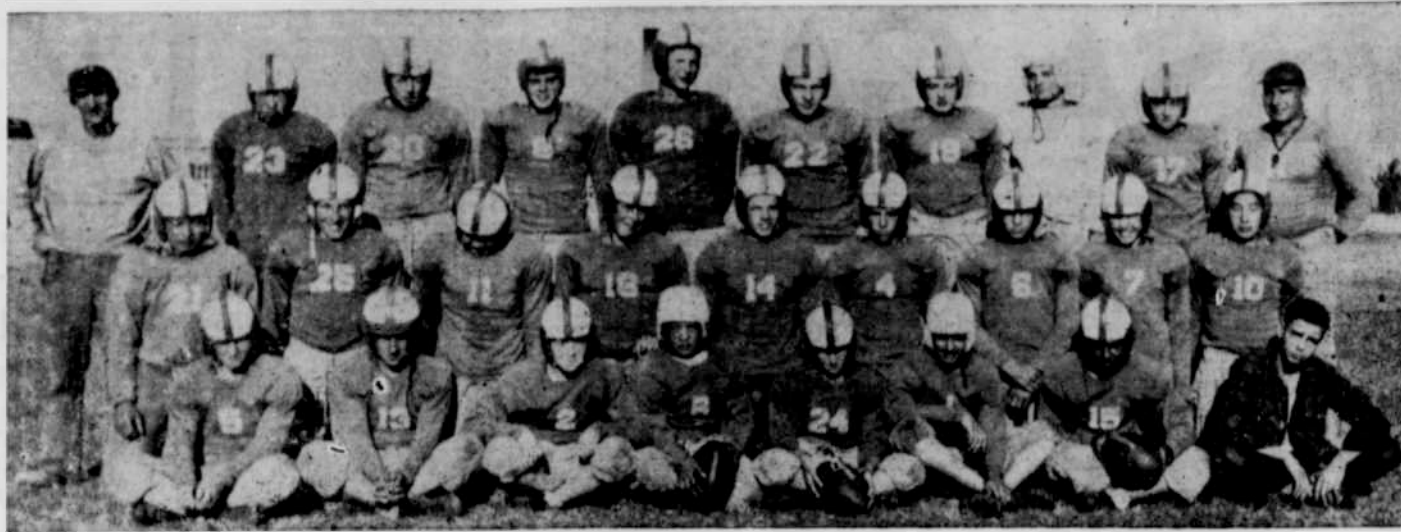
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NYSSA'S HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL TEAM FINISHES SUCCESSFUL SEASON

America Still Without Peace

thing', and were spoken by Napoleon, who died urging his son to attempt to the unification of Europe, not by the sword, but by the spirit.

"Men since the beginning of time have sought peace. Various methods through the ages have been attempted to devise an international process to prevent or settle disputes between nations. From the very start workable methods were found insofar as individual citizens were concerned, but the mechanics of an instrumentality of larger international scope have never been successful. We have had our last chance. If we do not now devise some greater and more equitable system Armageddon will be at our door.

"General Douglas MacArthur, supreme commander of the allied powers in the Pacific, said, 'The problem is basically theological and involves a spiritual recrudescence and improvement of human character that will synchronize with our almost matchless advance in science, art, literature and all material and culture developments of the past 2000 years. It must be of the spirit if we are to save the flesh.'

"That brings us face to face with an issue before the American people. It is now before congress; that is, compulsory peace-time military training. No issue except the Civil war has been so weighty in the life of this nation. I wish to go on record here and now that as an American citizen of the third generation and as a firm believer in democracy and freedom I am unalterably opposed to compulsory peace-time military training.

"I am firm in my conviction that the hour an American congress imposes upon free Americans the yoke of compulsory peace-time military training that hour we stand before the world the supreme contradiction of the ages. We repudiate democracy and bury freedom. We take up Prussian militarism in America while thousands who sleep on Europe's war-torn soil roll over in their resting places and curse the government that lied to get them to die.

"Do not get the impression that I am against all military training. I am not. In this kind of a world, we must be realistic. While we labor toward the ideal we must be sane and sensible.

"There is a democratic way to adequate military might for preservation and policing. We have the brains to work out that way. We have the brawn to carry it out. The whole world knows that we have demonstrated it twice in 28 years.

"Let free men know the truth. Set up a system of volunteer training; a system of schooling and pay a decent wage to men who must bear arms and train and serve to protect and police. Abandon the boresome routine of standing military forces and establish schooling and training which will contribute to civilian life when they return to it.

"While we focus the attention of American citizens on the crushing of militarism in Germany and Japan, let us be vigilant lest a small military clique in the United States fasten it on us. Nothing is settled until it is settled right and we will not settle things right by adopting the disproven system of Napoleon and Bismark, Hohenzollern and Hitler, Mussolini and Tojo.

"America is the laboratory of brotherhood. Here the people's of

ceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal. There is unfinished work, there is a task remaining before us, that is, to establish a just and lasting peace, to share the fruits of freedom and democracy with the peoples of the world. World leadership is ours. How shall we lead? Shall it be by the sword or the spirit? The unfinished work and the remaining task cannot be done with the impetus given by flashing uniforms, thrilling military the ends of the earth have gathered and in citizenship in a nation music and marching armies of millions. We need faith and not fear, hope and not despair, love and not hate, cool heads, warm hearts and steady will.

"The new world of justice, co-operation and brotherhood is at hand. It must come. It will come, but when? Will we hasten its coming or hinder it? Must we suffer more, must mankind go down to an irreducible minimum before a bruised beaten remnant struggles up to the light?

The program was opened with the high school orchestra playing one selection and the American Legion advancing the colors with Douglas McDonald and Delbert Rouse acting as color-bearers. The orchestra, directed by Lynn Lawrence, played the Star Spangled Banner and Chaplain LeRoy Herrman gave the prayer.

Don M. Graham, commander of the American Legion and master of ceremonies at the meeting said if Woodrow Wilson had been successful in his quest for world peace, "there is a question whether another war would have been necessary. Mr. Wilson died of a broken heart."

"Those of us who saw the handwriting on the wall tried to keep before the public the need of being prepared for something that might happen and that did happen on December 7, 1941. We organized veterans, the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars, feel that if our boys had been listened to 25 years ago we would not have another day to be remembered."

Mr. Graham introduced Mr. Herrman, past commander of the Nyssa post of the American Legion; H. O. Hopkins, senior vice-commander Arthur Rouse, adjutant; J. J. Kolien, district commander of the VFW; Mrs. Nellie Powell, president of the American Legion auxiliary in Nyssa, and Mrs. Wanda Sykes, president of the VFW auxiliary.

After another musical selection by the orchestra, Commander Graham stated that 2200 Malheur county men served in the armed forces during world war II. Four hundred have returned, but "43 will not return."

"We of the American Legion and VFW anticipated only a short life, not to exceed 35 years. These returning young men will give new blood to both organizations."

The commander then asked the veterans to stand, and also introduced A. O. Wells, chairman of the committee arranging the program.

Miss June Savage, accompanied at the piano by Miss Adrienne Peterson, sang "The Flag Without a Stain."

The orchestra accompanied the audience in singing two verses of America and two verses of America The Beautiful.

A parade sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars was held just prior to the program. The marchers gathered on First street and marched west on Main street to the gymnasium.

Groups participating in the parade were Veterans of Foreign Wars and auxiliary, American Legion and auxiliary, Owyhee Riding club, Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls, Cub Scouts, and high school band.

Reumes Trip—

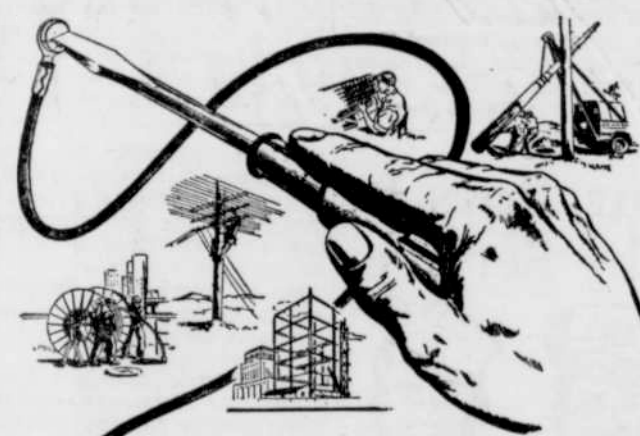
