### KINDS OF ATOMS KNOWN TO TOTAL 99

An atom is the smallest particle of an elementary substance that has all of the chemical properties of the element.

There are about ninety-two different kinds of atoms altogether, corresponding to the ninety-two different types of known elements. A hundred million of atoms placed side by side, would measure about the length of a centimeter, or less than half an inch.

It is hard for the average mind to conceive that atoms could be measured very accurately, but they are measured with the greatest exactness. They can be counted as well as large objects, and can be weighed more accurately than a ton of coal. Scientists know with the greatest precision how atoms behave in hundreds of different ways.

Energy released by the atom bomb may be as revolutionary in the history of mankind as fire. Fire, when first tamed by the cave man, could have been just as destructive as atomic power.

The splitting of the atom may not be much more than an invention of an explosive tens of thousands of times greater than dynamite. Even though dynamite has been used for many years as an explosive, scientists have not been able to make it into a source of power. So it might be with atomic energy, it will probably not be employed in commerce for many years.

By bringing the exploding specks of energy to an easy state, we may have electrical highways in the future where our cars and other motor vehicles can be driven by underground transformers.

An even more important use of atomic energy is to use it in the field of medicine. Properly controlled, neutron rays (rays produced when an atom is smashed) can be used much more effectively than the x-ray in examining the body substances, radio-active, most people know the good effects of radium on cancer, but it is very expensive because of its rarity. However, by bombarding inexpensive substances with neutron beams, they can have the same effect as radium.

With the invention of the atomic bomb, man will probably be able to control, at least partially, weather. A destructive hurricane could be broken up by an atom bomb dropped into its midst by an airplane.

Exhaustible as a source of heat atomic energy may be able to bring

into existence large areas of land at poles of the earth which could support life. Just a few ounces of a radio-active substance could heat a large city for a whole generation. The heat would be piped to homes from a centrally located plant. The home would be much more sanitary and beautiful without having to bother with the coal, wood, and other fuel burning stoves now in use.

### AMALGAMATED PAYS GROWERS 5 MILLION

Sugar beet growers in Idaho, Utah and Oregon will receive approximately \$5,000,000 from The Amalgamated Sugar Company for beets delivered during October, it is announced by H. A. Benning, President of the company.

This payment is based on about one-half millions tons of beets, or a little more than one-half of the total 1945 crop, which is estimated at 940,000 tons, and also represents an increase of \$80,000 over the first payment made in 1944, which was \$4,010,000.

Utah growers will receive \$664,938 from this payment; Idaho district farmers, which include Burley, Rupert and Twin Falls, \$882,621; and the Nampa, Idaho, and Nyssa, Oregon district \$3,351,809.

Sixty percent of The Amalgamated's current crop was grown in the Nyssa-Nampa district, which is served by the company's two largest and most modern plants located in those two towns.

Subsequent payments will be made on later beets delivered until the entire harvest is completed and all beets have been sent to receiving stations. The second payment will be made November 25, on all beets delivered from November 1 to 15, inclusive, according to Mr. Benning.

Sugar is now manufactured at The Amalgamated's factories at Rupert, Twin Falls, Nampa, Idaho; Lewiston, Utah; and Nyssa, Oregon. It is estimated that at the conclusion of the campaign in mid-January the company will have processed approximately 2,750,000 bags of sugar, or an increase of nearly 1,000,000 bags over 1944. The first millionth bag will be reached sometime next week.

That company's factory at Burley is still being utilized for the manufacture of dehydrated potatoes on U. S. government contract but will again operate for processing sugar in 1946, Mr. Benning said.

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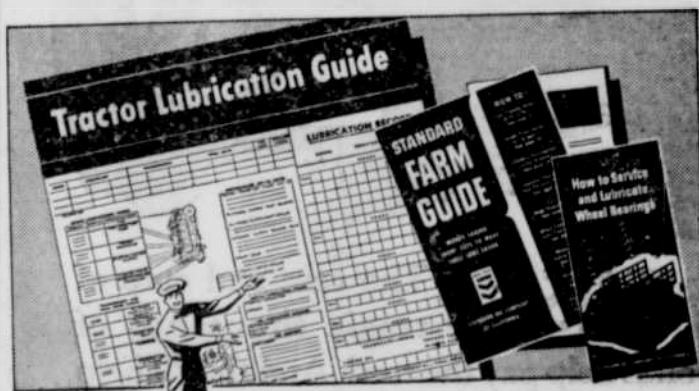
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
