Kitchen Chats

"IT'S FRUIT CAKE TIME"

Like Christmas shopping, fruit cakes should be made early. They can be wrapped in wax paper, cellophane, or even sealed in a baking dish until ready to unwrap, in all their glory, for the holiday season. They are nice to have on hand when friends drop in for a cup of coffee or for a friend's Christmas whose gift is "hard to find."

TREASURE CHEST FRUIT CAKE
14½ cups mixed chopped dried fruit.

1 cup heavy jelly.
½ cup dark corn syrup.
1 cup chopped nutmeats.
1 cup bran.
1½ teaspoons ground cloves.
2 teaspoons cinnamon.
2 teaspoons allspice.
1 teaspoon mace.
1 teaspoon ginger.
½ teaspoon salt.
2 tablespoons brandy flavoring.
2 teaspoons vanilla.
½ cup prune or grape juice.
2 cups butter or margarine.
2 ¼ cups sugar.
8 eggs well beaten.
7 cups sifted flour.
1 teaspoon soda.
3 teaspoons baking powder.
Combine fruit with jelly, syrup.

nutmeats, bran, spices, salt, flavorings and fruit juices; mix thoroughly and let stand while preparing batter. Blend butter and sugar thoroughly; add eggs and mix well. Sift flour with soda and baking powder and add half of it to the creamed mixture; beat well. Add fruit and mix thoroughly. Add remaining dry ingredients and stir until thoroughly blended. Pour into pans lined with waxed paper. Bake in slow oven (300 degrees F) about 2½ hours. Yield: 5, 2-pound cakes (5x9 inch loaf pans).

Note: Prunes, raisins, currents, citron, figs, candied pineapple, candied cherries and candied peel may be used in fruit mixture.
