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PRICE CONTROL NEEDED

The OPA has very pleasantly announced that it intends to retain its machinery for control of prices, although rationing of all merchandise except sugar has been discontinued. The OPA rightfully intends to "crack down" on any violators of price ceilings.

With rationing discontinued, control of prices will be more difficult because the old law of supply and demand will tend to make articles scarcer in this period of scarcity.

Of course, if manufacturers are withholding goods from the market until after January 1 with the intention of avoiding payment of some of the 1945 taxes as we have been told the new merchandise will help hold prices in line. The keen competition in certain lines will also help.

Perhaps the outstanding accomplishment of the administration in its economic experiments of the last decade has been its fight against the threat of inflation. We already have a mild form of inflation, but it is trivial as compared to what it would have been without some method of price control. The OPA should continue that control until economic conditions are near normal again.
