Council Employs Scout Executive

Hawley C. Taylor, president of the Ore-Ida council, Boy Scouts of America, today announced the employment of Richard S. Tuttle as field scout executive. Simultaneous with the announcement of Tuttle's employment, Mr. Taylor also announced plans for an expansion of the scope of scouting activity in the council.

"As we are able to raise more funds each year, and more money is available, we will continue to hire additional personnel," Taylor stated. "It has been proven that as we hire additional men, more and more boys can be served throughout the program of scouting."

Mr. Tuttle, a former instructor of physical education in the Caldwell schools, will make his home in Caldwell and will be responsible for the scouting activity in Caldwell, Notus, Greenleaf, Wilder, Parma, Middleton, Nyssa, Vale, Brogan, Harper, Burns, and all other towns in the southern half of the Ore-Ida council. L. T. Lundin of Emmett, assistant scout executive, will be responsible for the field service in the northern half of the council, including Emmett, Payette, Ontario, Weiser, New Meadows, Council, McCall, Cascade, Stibnite and other towns. J. H. Browne will continue to direct the scouting activity in Nampa, Melba, Kuna, and will have charge of the general administration of the entire area.

"Additional manpower will make it possible for each man on our staff to devote more time to the area assigned to him, and by bringing this more concentrated service will enrich the program for boys who are already Scouts, Cubs, Sea Scouts, Air Scouts, or Explorer Scouts and also make it possible for more boys to take part in the program of Scouting," Mr. Taylor stated. "Each time that we have added manpower to our professional staff our membership has increased, and at the present time we have the highest membership in the history of the Ore-Ida council."

The Ore-Ida council executive board, of which A. L. Child of Nyssa is a member, met in Weiser Monday to adopt plans for 1946.
