who homesteaded on the ground where the sugar factory now stands. It was his barn which served as a guidemark for settlers coming in from the surrounding country on their way to Ontario on their semi-annual shopping trips.

"By 1892 the need for a school was recognized and school district No. 26 was organized. An old house about two miles north of Nyssa served as a school building for three summer months of the first term. The Lackey family furnished most of the pupils, having five of the nine enrolled. John Daren was the first teacher. Attendance grew steadily and by 1902,

there being an average attendance of 30 pupils, a new two room building was built which seated 90 students. Two teachers, Professor J. T. Smith and Miss Crandell were employed and at this time the 9 month term began. Later a large 3 story school large enough to accommodate ten grades was built, but this building was destroyed by fire in 1934.

Nyssa's first church building was the Community Church which was built around 1900 on the site where Thompson's Service Station now stands. All denominations held services in this building and the clergymen came from different parts of the state to conduct services. In 1909 the Methodist Church was built where the Signal Oil Station is now, and stood for 30 years, being finally destroyed by fire. Since then many fine churches have been built and many more are being planned.

"Up until 1909, the townsite of Nyssa was all on the east side of the railroad tracks. All irrigated land was under the Owyhee ditch. As the Owyhee project began to take on the possibility of being a real project, the center of activity was Nyssa, and the town took on new life. The townsite was laid out on the west side of the tracks. Streets were graded and buildings of brick and cement were constructed which replaced the frame structures, and soon all business was transferred to the west side of town.

"A \$30,000 bridge was built in 1911, Nyssa paying one third of the cost. Today we think of this bridge as a narrow, ungainly object, but think what it meant to those people and what its loss would mean to us today. Dr. Sarazin used to swim his team of horses

and buggy across the river to answer calls from his patients.

"The Owyhee irrigation district was kept alive, and finally the government signed an agreement to irrigate the lands. Nyssa's long cherished hope was realized. Again Nyssa took on new life. A modern street lighting system was installed. Around 80 new residences were built. New buildings were erected on the new land. In 1924 the Owyhee dam was approved, and in 1932 it was completed with 715,000 acres of water made available for valley farms. Thousands of new settlers came to take up the land now irrigable under this new project. A new and modern sugar factory was completed in 1938. Nyssa had made great strides, but with the coming of the sugar factory she put on ten league boots."
