SOCIAL SECURITY CARD IS VALUABLE

A social security account number shows that the worker has an insurance account with the United

States government, federal old-age survivors insurance, according to Vernon A. Wells, manager of the social security board's office, at La Grande.

"Insurance policies must be protected and that is why they are kept in safe places," Wells said. "The social security account card is evidence of a worker's insurance policy with the government. Give it the same care as any insurance policy."

For every account number it gives out, the social security board sets up a separate account. The number on the card is the same as the number on the account. With the worker's name it identifies the ac-

count.

Old-age is not the only risk the account insures against. The purpose of this insurance is to pay not only a regular monthly income when workers are 65 and stop work, but to pay benefits to the family if the worker dies.

These monthly insurance payments are based on wages in the jobs that come under the old-age and survivors insurance system. Every day's pay on such a job helps to build up this family insurance protection.
