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Two New Stores To Be Opened In Nyssa Saturday

Announcements Made By Nyssa Food Center, Hollingsworth

The first business structure to be opened in Nyssa under the anticipated building program here will be the new Chadwick building, occupied by the Nyssa Food Center and the Hollingsworth Hardware and Implement company at Sixth and Main streets.

The new earth block building was erected by Al Chadwick, with Albert Held as the contractor in charge. The structure, 80 by 88 feet, contains modern heating system that provides heat for both businesses.

The Nyssa Food Center, formerly Chadwick's drive-in, has been moved to the new building, and will hold its formal opening Saturday, February 2. The Hollingsworth company will also hold its opening Saturday, beginning at 8:30 a. m. The Hollingsworth Hardware and Implement company has conducted its business in Nyssa for the last two years in the Morgan building across Main street from the post office, with Murle Marcum as manager.

In the new location, the company has a shop, 20 by 50 feet, for repairing tractors and farm machinery. A factory trained mechanic will be in charge. The concern has established an enlarged parts room, in which all types of parts for John Deere implements will be handled. The fixtures are finished in the traditional John Deere colors of yellow and green.

The company will also carry a regular line of heavy hardware and electrical appliances.

Chadwick Here 10 Years

Al Chadwick is observing his 10th anniversary in the grocery business in Nyssa this month. His son, Vernon, recently purchased an interest in the business.

The floor space of the Nyssa Food Center is 32 by 80 feet, with part of it used as a furnace room and storage room. The interior of the store and all equipment are finished in white. The concrete floor is painted red.

The company has installed a modern combination walk-in, reach-in for meats and other perishable goods, a large meat display case, an electric meat saw and electric meat chopper. A nice vegetable rack has been installed to keep produce fresh.

Conservation On Malheur Farms Will Be Studied

County-Wide Meeting Of AAA Committeemen Is Held

An inventory of conservation needs on all Malheur county farms and ranches was started at a county wide meeting of AAA committeemen and other farm leaders Tuesday, January 29, Glen L. Hutchinson, chairman of the county AAA committee, announced.

Methods for completing the survey were made at the meeting, Mr. Hutchinson said. It will show the kind and extent of conservation practices needed to repair damage caused by soil erosion and depletion, and the work needed to prevent future damage to the county's agricultural resources. The amount of necessary work for which assistance will be needed also will be determined.

"With this survey, we will be able to appraise our present position—whether we are tearing down our soil resources faster than we are building them back," Mr. Hutchinson said. "It will also enable us to determine whether the present agricultural conservation program is adequate to do the job."

"Since our forefathers first started farming this country some 300 years ago, more than 100 million acres of land have been depleted and eroded beyond repair," he declared. "Another 125 million acres have been seriously damaged, and another 100 million acres is in danger right now."

To this union were born five daughters and three sons; Mrs. Edith Riley of Ontario, Mrs. Emma Quisenberry and Miss Mary Glenn of Vale, Mrs. A. E. High who preceded her father in death, and Mrs. J. C. Morfitt of Wilder, Idaho; Arthur T. Glenn, Hailey, Idaho, and Charles W. Glenn of Vale, Malheur county sheriff. He is also survived by two brothers Frank Glenn of Vale and Walter Glenn of Seattle, and a sister, Mrs. Etta Holland of Burns; ten grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Glenn celebrated their 62nd wedding anniversary last July in Boise.

Mr. Glenn was a stockman and farmer all of his adult life and continued to operate ranch and livestock property owned jointly with his son Charles, up to the time of his death.

Schools Follow Health Program

A definite health interest has been shown in the Nyssa schools, which are participating in the special health instruction project sponsored by the state department of education for the school year 1945-46.

Miss Helen Dempster of the state department announced here this week.

The project is conducted under the direction of Miss Dempster, supervisor, and is made possible through a grant from the W. K. Kellogg foundation of Battle Creek, Michigan.

The seven participating schools in Oregon are serving as laboratory centers for experimentation to increase the effectiveness of health instruction. Some of the projects involve a total school health program while others are concerned only with the girls in the upper two years of high school.

In Nyssa a meeting of the health faculty was held on the occasion of each visit of Miss Dempster. The group has been analyzing the school health program and is now assured that health is being taught to every student to the satisfaction of the state department of education requirements.

Health topics have been added to the instruction in the following courses: Biology, orientation, social economics and physical education. The schools have purchased additional reference books and has shown more health films.

In physical education classes teachers are conducting new state physical fitness programs, which means that the youngsters are being tested for agility, speed, strength and endurance.

A set of four questionnaires on interest, attitudes, information and practices in health are given all ninth, 10th and 11th grade students to determine their background in health. From these tests, findings are used for class discussions in correcting mis-information or lack of knowledge.

New health instruction material for Oregon schools has been developed by a subcommittee under the direction of the state joint committee for health and physical fitness, and has been in effect since September, 1945. The experimental projects can serve as a probing ground for the new program since it is possible to investigate more thoroughly the suggestion class activities to know whether they are within the range of possibility for schools of all sizes and types.

In this way, the project can make a very definite contribution to the state program of health education.

City Must Furnish Lots; Government To Pay Other Expenses

A talk by Julian Morfitt of Ontario, county service officer, and a general discussion at the weekly luncheon of the Nyssa chamber of commerce Wednesday noon revealed that the city expects to apply to the federal housing administration for construction of a large number of houses for use of veterans.

The chamber of commerce voted to turn the project over to the city council for prosecution.

Mr. Morfitt said "A lot of good men have come to this county to live but have been unable to stay because they could not get houses."

Thousands of houses are to be allocated by the government for use of veterans only. The houses are to be used for two years after the emergency and then ownership will revert to the city. The cities must provide the sites for the houses, but the federal government will provide money for construction of sewers, streets, water systems and other facilities. Rentals will be collected by the cities, which will deduct collection expense and send the balance to the federal housing administration. The houses cannot be bought but can only be rented by the veterans.

Mr. Morfitt said he would "like to see the city allocate the lots it owns to the veterans," but chamber members pointed out that the number owned by the city of Nyssa is negligible.

The construction cost of such houses is limited under the veterans priority to not more than \$10,000. The government guarantees \$4000 of the loans.

The number of houses to be requested by the city of Nyssa was not definitely decided upon at the meeting.

In opening his remarks, Mr. Morfitt said "The veteran payroll will be the largest in the county in the next four years."

Twenty-two per cent of the veterans will draw pensions ranging from \$11 to \$140 a month. Between 300 and 500 men will draw an average of \$50 a month.

Don Graham of Nyssa, prominent ex-serviceman, said Malheur county sent 2280 men into the service. Of this number 728 have already returned. Twelve veterans have had jobs in Nyssa, but had to leave because they could not find houses. At least 40 houses are needed in Nyssa for veterans, in addition to the houses needed by other persons.

HUTCHINSON NAMED ON BAKER PCA BOARD

Glenn L. Hutchinson, Ontario, was elected for a three year term to the board of directors of the Baker Production Credit association, when that organization met in Ontario and later at an adjourned meeting in Baker. He fills the vacancy left by the resignation of J. D. Billingsley, who had served on the board since the organization meeting twelve years ago.

The association reported that since its organization it had made 2389 loans amounting to more than 15 million dollars. After paying four annual dividends aggregating \$24,546.70, reserves on hand amount to \$100,901.78. F. A. Phillips, Baker is president.
