EARLY HISTORY OF MALHEUR AREA DISCUSSED BY J. R. GREGG, EX-RESIDENT

(Continued from last week)

In connection with the series of articles published by J. R. Gregg, Edward L. King of Ontario told the Gate City Journal that "I discovered today that you are publishing a series of articles under the caption 'Early History of Malheur Area Is Discussed By J. R. Gregg, Ex-resident, implying that I am collaborating with Mr. Gregg in these articles."

"This endeavor was launched by Mr. Gregg while I was in California and I knew nothing about it until I returned. This was done without my knowledge or my consent. While I was in California, I had some correspondence with Mr. Gregg about the early days in Ontario. My letters were written with no thought of their being published. I object to any article being published that contains quotations of any kind from my letters until the manuscript has been submitted to me and returned to you with my approval."

Another station on the Auburn-Boise stage route was established by Wm. L. Logan at Weiser. The town, which was named for Jacob Weiser, was started by Mr. Weiser 1873 Wm. L. Logan moved to way about 1865. Jacob Weiser had mined on Salmon River and the headwaters of the Weiser River and the Weiser River also took its name from him. In the fall of 1886 Wm. L. Logan moved to lower Willow Creek and became one of the first residents of the present Malheur County. The homestead he located there remained in the possession of the Logan family for seventy-seven years until it was recently sold by J. T. (Tom) Logan, a son of Wm. Logan.

Miller station, another stage station on the old Auburn-Boise stage line, stood on the site of the present town of Huntington. In 1881 two brothers, Alfred H. and J. B. Huntington, purchased the Miller stage station and secured title to the land where the town that took their name now stands. The Oregon Railway and Navigation Company, building east from Portland and the Oregon Short Line, a branch of the Union Pacific, building from Granger, Wyoming, formed a junction at Huntington early in 1884.

Going back to the "covered wagon days," the old Oregon Trail separated into several branches after entering the Snake River valley near the present town of Montpelier, Idaho, where the trail first forked. The north trail came to Snake River at old Fort Hall, where it again forked, one branch crossed the river at that point and continued down along the north side of that stream for some distance. The other trail followed along not far from the south bank of the river. The extreme south trail did not come in sight of Snake River until nearing American Falls, where it intersected the trail from Fort Hall that followed near the south bank of the river. These two reunited trails continued on to Glenn's Ferry, where they again separated, the north fork here crossed Snake River to unite with the extreme north trail to continue on past Mountain Home until it came to the Boise River near south Boise. From there this trail went down the Boise River until nearing the present town of Middleton, where the north branch crossed the Boise River and then crossed over to the Payette River valley near the present town of New Plymouth. Here this trail separated again, one fork went down the Payette valley until it came to the Washoe ferry. The other prong crossed the Payette River near Little Willow Creek and passed down the Snake River valley past the present town of Weiser and crossed Snake River at Olds ferry.

Going back to where the trail separated near the present town of Middleton, the left fork followed down the south bank of the Boise River and did not cross that stream until it neared old Fort Boise. Before ferries were installed early emigrants crossed Snake River in make shift ferries, sometimes made of wagon-beds, and swimming their stock across the river. After the ferries were installed branch emigrant trails were established along the west bank of Snake River between the Riverside and Washoe ferries and also from Washoe ferry over the Dead Ox Flat to Olds ferry. Mrs. Lizzie Bressman told me that Dead Ox Flat attained its name when a large fine ox, attached to an emigrant wagon, died somewhere along the trail crossing that flat. She also gave me the information concerning the branch trails between the ferries. I have since then uncovered more evidence that the trail between the Riverside and Washoe ferries ran through the present city of Ontario near the cemetery and east of Holy Rosary hospital. It is evident that the old rusted belt found by boys playing on a vacant lot near the Mrs. L. Adams home came from an emigrant wagon; also the tap to cut threads on the inside of burrs, that was found just north of the Ontario cemetery by Albert Beals in 1941.
