CHICKEN FOR FANCIER FARE Chicken adds a festive touch and in this month of red-letter days we can serve it often. There are so many excuses for celebration in February and "A La King" served on crispy, crunchy Melba toast points fill the bill. Just cut white bread thin, and arrange on a baking sheet which bakes "just right" with the control set at 300 degrees. In 45 minutes the bread will be a beautiful brown.

CHICKEN A LA KING
 1/2 cup fat
 3/4 cup flour
 2 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/8 teaspoon white pepper
 3/4 cups chicken stock
 1 cup top milk
 3/4 cup sliced cooked mushrooms
 1/4 cup diced green pepper, cooked
 1/4 cup diced pimiento
 2 1/2 cups diced chicken
 Melt fat and blend in flour, salt and pepper. Add chicken stock and milk gradually while stirring. Cook until smooth and thickened. Add vegetables and chicken, and heat thoroughly. Serve on toast points or in patty shells. (Serves 8.)

EARLY HISTORY OF MALHEUR AREA DISCUSSED BY J. K. GREGG, EX-RESIDENT

(Continued from last week)

"Starting from the Ontario postoffice running west two miles, thence south nine miles past Arcadia to within one mile of the Nyssa schoolhouse, thence west one mile, thence south one mile, thence east to the schoolhouse, thence north two miles, retraversing the same route one mile, thence east one mile, thence north along the old emigrant road eight and one-half miles, via the Fair View school house to the Ontario postoffice. Length of route, 25 miles; area covered, 30 square miles; number of houses on route, 119; population served, 595. No change can be made on the route as laid down unless by direct order from the department. In connection with this service requisition has been made for two collection boxes to be placed at the following points by the carrier. One at the Arcadia postoffice and one at the Nyssa schoolhouse."

The above account taken from the report submitted by Postoffice Inspector Clement is conclusive evidence that that rural route follows along over eight miles one branch of the old Oregon trail between Nyssa and Ontario, that was once traveled by early day emigrants. From the above it is easy to trace the old emigrant road that passed just east of the Fairview school house and the C. E. and W. S. Reese farms and west of the old Josiah Carter place, which was later the Harry Plummer place.

It may be news to some of the present day residents of the Arcadia vicinity to know that Arcadia once had a postoffice at the old K. S. and D. ranch and also a depot and railroad sidetrack about one mile east of the postoffice. The Arcadia postoffice was discontinued at the time the rural route was established. On the same date the rural route order went into effect the Ontario postoffice was advanced from a fourth class to a third class office in 1914, about the time I took charge as postmaster, the office was advanced from a third to a second class postoffice. About a year or so later the R. F. D. was extended west to the western boundary of the C. W. Mallett ranch in the White Settlement.

Returning again to the point where the Oregon Trail first separated after entering the Snake River Valley the south trail continued along the south bank of that river, never crossing that stream. This trail crossed the Idaho-Oregon line somewhere in the vicinity of the present town of Homedale, Idaho, and Adrian, Oregon, and then crossed the Owyhee River a short distance above the mouth. About a mile west of old Fort Boise this trail connected with the trail that had crossed Snake River at the Riverside ferry. The united trails continued on in a northwesterly direction over the divide and came to the Malheur River ford at the hot springs near where the present city of Vale is now located. From the Malheur ford this trail went up Willow Creek a short distance where it again parted. Near Tub Springs the right hand trail joined with the trail that had crossed Snake River at the Washoe ferry and they continued on until they came to Farewell Bend on Snake River to join the north trail that had crossed Snake River at Olds ferry. The less traveled trail continued up Willow Creek from near where it had separated with the south trail, and crossed over the divide on to the John Day River, and was called the John Day Trail. The present

John Day Highway follows close to this emigrant trail along Willow Creek and the John Day River until it comes to The Dallas.

The first two emigrant trains to travel the Oregon Trail came over the route from Fort Hall to old Fort Boise and the south trail that never crossed Snake River, and both these trains crossed the Malheur River at the Vale hot springs. The first of these two trains led by Dr. Elijah White and Lansford B. Hastings, left their wagons at Greens River and came on from there on horseback. At Fort Hall the emigrants divided into two factions, one led by White and the other by Hastings. The White party crossed Snake River near the fort and again at Fort Boise. The Hastings party was the first to travel the south trail and never crossed the river. Both parties crossed the Malheur River at the Vale hot springs. The White-Hastings party, which started west from near Independence, Mo., in the spring of 1842, was the first covered wagon train to cross the plains.

The first emigrant train to travel the Oregon Trail the entire distance in covered wagons came the next year, 1843, from Westport, (Kansas City). This wagon train, which was guided from Fort Hall as far as Grand Ronde valley by Dr. Marcus Whitman, forded Snake River at Three Islands, near the present Glenn's Ferry, and according to the historian, H. W. Bancroft, again forded the river at Fort Boise. According to Bancroft they raised their wagon-beds by placing blocks of wood between the beds and running-gear. Dr. Whitman, with his missionary par-

ty of five, had crossed the plains in two wagons, from Liberty, Mo., accompanied by a party of trappers as far as Green River in 1836. There they left one of the wagons and brought the other one on to Fort Hall. Soon after leaving Fort Hall the wagon broke down and Dr. Whitman converted part of the running gear and two hind wheels into a cart, which he brought on to Fort Boise. This was the farthest west a wheeled vehicle had traveled the Oregon trail up to that date. Dr. Whitman guided the emigrant train of 1843 over the same route his missionary party of three men and two women, one of whom was his wife, had been guided by a party of Hudson Bay Company trappers in 1836.
