Kitchen Chats

DESSERT FOR SUGAR SAVERS

A chocolate pie will make any man happy no matter how hard he worked or how many things went wrong. Set a beautiful pie on the table with plenty of rich velvety-smooth chocolate filling encased in a tender pie crust and mounds of meringue and you can make the most every day meal look glamorous. It's a taste treat for family and guests.

CHOCOLATE MERINGUE PIE

1/2 cup sugar (or 1/2 cup honey)
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 squares Baker's Chocolate
2 teaspoons butter
1 baked 9-inch pie shell
6 tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup flour
2 1/2 cups milk
3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
2 teaspoons vanilla
3 egg whites

Combine sugar, flour, and salt in top of double boiler, mixing very thoroughly. Add milk gradually, stirring well. Add chocolate. Place over boiling water and cook until chocolate is melted and mixture is thick and well blended, stirring constantly. Then continue cooking 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Pour small amount of mixture over egg yolks, stirring vigorously; return to double boiler and cook 2 minutes longer. Add butter and vanilla. Cool. Turn into pie shell.

Beat egg whites until foamy throughout; add sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time; beating after each addition until sugar is blended. Then continue beating until mixture will stand in peaks. Pile lightly on filling. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F) 15 minutes, or until the meringue is delicately browned.
