COMODITY LOANS MATURE SOON

The approach of commodity loan deadlines brings a reminder to producers from committeemen that loans on 1945 commodities must be repaid before maturity dates, or the collateral commodity will be acquired by Commodity Credit. Potato loans mature April 1, and April 30 is the maturity date for other loan programs, including grains and seeds.

OREGON WHEAT HELPS FEED STARVING FOLK

An increasing volume of Oregon wheat is on its way to relieve famine conditions abroad. Some 20 ships are loading wheat in Portland now, as a result of heavy movement from interior elevator in the past several weeks. The Portland office of the Grain Branch, PMA, reported heavy offerings of "excess" wheat from country shippers under the wheat control order. Boxcars were plentiful, and no goner were bottlenecking shipments.

POTATO CEILINGS STILL SUSPENDED

Ceiling prices on white potatoes will continue to be suspended for the present, OPA has announced. However, they may be re-established without prior warning, should the recent upward trend in potato prices result in prices staying above former ceilings. White potatoes will automatically go back under control about April 8, if OPA does not re-establish ceilings before that time and if the suspension period is not again extended.

AAA COMMITTEEMEN NAMED ON EMERGENCY FOOD WORK

Chairman of county agricultural conservation committees have been designated by Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson as local emergency food program managers to help speed the job of supplying food under the President's emergency famine relief program. These farmer-committeemen will enlist the cooperation of all local groups who are willing to promote the conservation of food in order to save the lives of people in other lands. Specific goals and conservation measures will be worked out and launched locally.

Harvey Miller, State Director of the Production and Marketing Administration named by the Secretary as the state manager, says: "How many lives are saved through voluntary local efforts to conserve food so that others may live will depend more upon individual efforts than upon elaborate programs. We need the co-operation of every group and specific ways in which this can be done. If this is done adequately and quickly, the results will be the product of our individual applications of the Golden Rule. I am confident that our people will cooperate generously if they appreciate the need. Compared with others we have a great abundance of food and we are being asked to share a small part of it in order that others may live."

SPRING LAMB CROP BELOW A YEAR AGO

For the fifth year in succession, the early spring lamb crop in the principal producing states is smaller than a year earlier, the USDA Reports. The decrease, estimated at 13 per cent, is relatively the largest since the production decline began. The early lamb crop is the smallest in nearly two decades as a result of the decline in the number of breeding ewes and some decrease in the percentage of lambs saved.
