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CROP, FEED LOANS ARE NOW AVAILABLE

Returning veterans as well as other farmers who are unable to obtain credit through Production Credit associations or on reasonable terms from other sources may obtain small production loans through the emergency crop and feed loan division of the farm credit administration, department of agriculture, said Harry P. Looney, supervisor, whose office is in the Ritz Theatre building at Payette.

These loans, Mr. Looney explained, are limited to an amount which, together with the unpaid balance of any similar loan made during the calendar year, does not exceed \$400, thus making it possible for a truck gardener, for instance, who produces both early and late crops, to obtain two or more loans during the calendar year.

The rate of interest on all types of loans is 4 per cent and there are no fees or charges other than the small cost of filing the necessary lien instruments. Loan checks are written in the Spokane office and

funds are therefore immediately available.

Loan funds may be used for feed, seed, fertilizer, gas and oil and other production costs including water assessments, incidentals and repairs for farm machinery and equipment.

Security for the loans is a crop mortgage on the current year's crops in the case of a crop loan. On feed loans a first lien on the stock to be fed is required.

Information concerning these loans may be obtained by writing Mr. Looney at P. O. Box 183, Payette, Idaho or by contacting him in person at the city hall in Nyssa from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. on the following dates:

Tuesday, April 2, 16, and 30, and May 14 and 28 or at his Payette office in the Ritz Theater building all day Mondays and Fridays of each week. He further advises that his travel schedule for March, April and May can be found in all offices of farm security administration, AAA and county agent of each county.

(Continued from Page 1) ers and labor officials attended the meeting.

Lane, who has charge of transported labor for the Idaho and Malheur county area, revealed during the morning session what the government provides for transported labor camps and what sponsoring organizations are required to furnish.

Beck provided information and guidance concerning the labor program.

Even if no agreement is reached with the Mexican government concerning the use of Mexican nationals this year, Lane inferred that there is a possibility for the so-called imported laborers such as Mexicans, Jamaicans, and British Hondurans, the sponsoring organizations are responsible for 60 per cent of the outlay, with the government providing the remaining 40 per cent of the funds. The association contribution is to be in kind and sponsors are responsible for the feeding of the personnel. The government provides medical care

Lane indicated that the camps may be either government operated or may be grower operated, providing growers meet certain requirements.

In grower operated camps the government charges rent at the rate of one per cent of the government inventory per month. On government operated camps the government charges the grower five cents per individual per day for housing charges. If the government provides mess equipment, the grower association must pay \$1 per head per month, determined by kitchen capacity, Lane indicated that for camps of this type the government provides all equipment within the limits of its inventories.

As the regulations now stand the sponsoring associations are responsible for transportation costs for the prisoners of war from Rupert, Idaho, to this county and return to the prisoners of war base. Erection of camp sites is also a responsibility of the committee.
