Baking Powder Biscuits were tried in every conceivable way and good results obtained by changing a standard baking powder recipe in the following way:

1 decrease fat content by 1 tablespoon,
2 increase flour 1/4 cup,
3 increase baking temperature 25 degrees.

STANDARD BAKING POWDER BISCUITS
2 cups bread flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons lard or other shortening

3/4 to 1 cup milk
1-Sift flour and measure. Sift again with baking powder and salt.
2-Work shortening into flour until mixture resembles corn meal.
3-Add milk and mix thoroughly.
4-Toss on a lightly floured board and knead slightly.
5-Roll out to desired thickness, one-half inch thick for a medium biscuit.
6-Cut with a cutter and place on a sheet or in a shallow pan.
7-Bake in a preheated oven. Temperature—475 degrees. Time 10-15 minutes.
