thinking of my twin girl babies. I was so glad to have the clothing and the wonderful toilet soap. Good soap still is unobtainable not even for babies, so you can understand what a worry that is and how hard to keep their tender skin pure and whole.

"To my joy did I find a pair of baby shoes for each of them. The boys were so happy that some one sent such wonderful gifts for their little baby sisters. The boys miss their father so; he was so good to us all. It will be a year on the 25th of this month when we paid our debt to the Germans.

"I nursed the babies myself and now they get porridge made with buttermilk and rice flour, which we buy on baby rations, and brown beans and vegetables. They need fruit, but there is no fruit. Only once did they have one pound of oranges, but they are doing fine and are weighing 14 pounds each.

"Please thank all the good people who gave the clothing and many, many thanks to you for sending the clothing. We are so happy to know there still are people in this world who want to give. The last years it was just the opposite; they took from us instead of giving. To all of you so far from us, our best regards and love from the children."
