Letter To The Editor

Having been interested in the growth and development of the territory now known as the Vale-Owyhee projects for over 40 years, I feel it my duty to try to acquaint the settlers of these two projects with the part the Idaho Power company played in reclaiming this barren waste and making it what it is today. It looked like a hopeless job and in fact had it not been for men who had vision and courage it would still be the land inhabited by coyotes, rattlesnakes and horned larks.

The men who financed and operated the Idaho Power company were the pioneers of this country who saw the need of such an organization. I truthfully believe this company during these long years of "living on faith" had more to do with keeping up that faith than any other organization. When this country was in darkness except for a candle or a kerosene lamp, light was furnished at such a rate that no community could afford to be without it. When men like A. G. Kingman came here with relatives and friends from Illinois eager to find homes it was the Idaho Power that built lines and furnished power that water could be placed on the lands. I could name dozens of little groups and also individuals from Homedale to Weiser on this side of the river who made good homes through the consistent efforts and cooperation of the company. Never did they refuse to extend their lines if it were humanly possible in order to make a home. I know also that some of these extensions were made at a loss. Never did the company relinquish their interest in the community.

When the time came for all to join in obtaining gravity water they were among the first to assist in building the projects. I do not know, but I believe that many old accounts for power were charged off. Today, I do not know of any community from the Great lakes to the Pacific coast getting better light and power service for the same money.

I do not have any financial interest in this company, but I feel a debt of gratitude for the great interest it has always taken in up-building and assisting in the growth and development of this country.

The Idaho Power company is a solvent going concern which has been successful on account of its sound policy and the service rendered the public. If you vote it out of existence you may have instead a political concern with an incompetent vacillating management depending on squeezing the already overburdened taxpayer for any deficiency arising through their error and incompetency.

So, in concluding, I would caution everyone to think twice before voting it out of existence, for

you may do yourselves and this community irreparable damage.

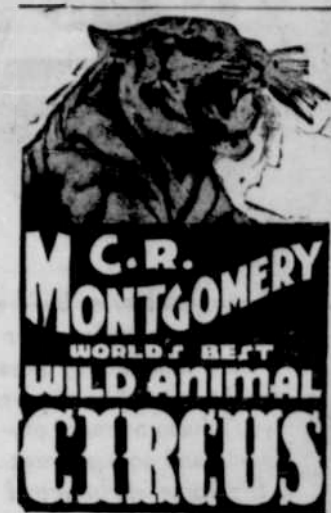
