Murolo, Morris Going to Italy

Vincenzo Murolo, Italian sculptor, who came to Nyssa as a guest of Dr. and Mrs. K. E. Kerby, and Thomas Morris of Nyssa will leave Monday or as soon thereafter as possible for Italy, where they will make a collection of Italian art for exhibition in this country.

The two men will drive to New York City in Morris' automobile and will take the machine across the Atlantic for use in Italy, where they will spend three weeks. They will return to the United States the latter part of July with many articles of Italian art, which will be shown in the larger cities throughout the country. The central office and permanent exhibit will be in Nyssa. The first show will be held in the Boise gallery of arts.

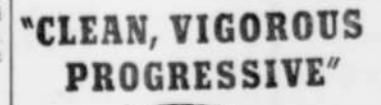
