

Suggestions On Pheasants Made

A recommendation that existing bag limits on Mongolian pheasants and Hungarian partridges remain in effect will be presented to the members of the Malheur Game league at a meeting set for May 27 in the Boulevard Grange hall, members of the game bird committee said Wednesday.

The present limit calls for four pheasant roosters a day or eight in any seven consecutive days and five "Huns" a day or ten in any seven consecutive days.

If the membership of the league approves the recommendation, it

will be presented to the state game commission. Also up for the approval of the Malheur county group is a recommendation that a permanent game bird refuge be established in Malheur county.

In addition to the silver star decoration, Pvt. Nishimura wears the most prized possession of the infantryman, the combat infantryman's badge, the good conduct medal, the victory medal and the European theater ribbon with participating stars for the Rhineland, North Apennines and Po valley campaigns.

His citation read: "When his platoon was pinned down by machine gun fire, Pvt. Nishimura, on his own initiative, stood up with his automatic rifle and neutralized one machine gun by killing its crew, capturing three others and causing the rest to withdraw. Later, when it became necessary for the platoon to withdraw in face of superior enemy forces, he stood upon the enemy again and covered his platoon's withdrawal. Pvt. Nishimura's continuous desire to safeguard his comrades and his gallantry in the face of the enemy, is in keeping with the high traditions of the army of the

United States."

Pvt. Nishimura is presently with Company L of the 442nd regimental combat team. Having been awarded the coveted silver star medal makes him eligible to return shortly to the United States for discharge.
