Dr. Miller Urges End To War Talk

(Continued from Page 1)
which causes us to do the thing whether we want to or not. We won the war mainly through the will. We can't win the peace with any less effort."

Pointing to the increase in literacy during the last few years, Dr. Miller said "A million more people can read than could read before the war. When people learn to read, something happens. We white people are in the great minority and don't think we have a monopoly on brains."

"There is the political approach the social approach and the democratic approach. It takes a lot of moral courage to practice democracy."

"We are living in a dangerous world. The atomic bomb is perfectly harmless. It is the people who handle atomics who make them dangerous. We are in the midst of a world revolution and you can't stop it. What you can do is to help direct it. If we direct this democracy right, we don't need to fear this world revolution."

"Our world is a hopeful world. I think it is in a very hopeful mess, because we are forced to solve some of our problems. We have some acute problems and they demand solution. We can't ignore the world any more."

"We live in a world of law. Then this is a moral universe. That is why Japan and Germany are where they are today. You can't do as you please and get away with it."

"We also find despair. Our world today is a challenge to us to do our best and be our best."

Henry H. Hartley, superintendent of the Nyssa schools, introduced Dr. Miller.

After the high school band, directed by Lynn Lawrence, played the Monte Cristo Overture and the Processional Grand March, Rev. C. L. Callahan of the Episcopal church offered prayer.

In the salutatory, Beverly Ure stated that commencement "Means the commencement of life that will put to the test the things we have learned. Success will depend upon us. It is our great fortune to be graduating in a new era, the atomic era. However, our era is not without its problems."

"The nation faces a problem in unemployment. As long as capital and labor cannot agree we are not in a position to solve world problems."

The speaker pointed out that religion should be the solidifying force among men, but added that "along with religious intolerance we have racial prejudice. If the American people really want to solve their problems, solutions will be begun to appear."

Hisako Kido, the valedictorian, reminded the large crowd in attendance that the class of 1946 entered high school during the war years and remained under the war clouds during most of the four years in Nyssa high school.

"Fear and suspicion have increased because of the atomic bomb," Miss Kido said. "Discontent rests with people all over the United States. In a world such as this we need people who think wisely. It is the responsibility of the youth of today to enforce the peace of tomorrow. If our voices are loud enough they will be effective."

Superintendent Hartley, in presenting awards to students of high scholastic standing, pointed out the difficulties of remaining in school during the last four years. The class numbering between 75 and 80 when it entered high school consisted of 52 at graduation and all of these students were not present at the exercises. Many were lured from school by high wages and others entered the armed forces.

Mr. Hartley presented a certificate of award from the Reader's Digest to Hisako Kido. He introduced other high ranking scholars as follows: Beverly Ure, Greta Stutz, Beth Mitchell, Virginia Troutner, Myrna Jordan, awarded a scholarship to the Eastern Oregon College of Education at La Grande; Ray Bybee, Junice Ege, also a scholarship to Eastern Oregon College of Education; Udell Poulsen, Marjorie Merrick, scholarship to Eastern Oregon college, and Janet Irving, editor of the Bulldog. Student Body President Tom Moore was attending a state track meet in Corvallis.

The American Legion certificates awarded annually to the outstanding boy and outstanding girl of the senior class were presented to Greta Stutz and Ray Bybee by Don M. Graham, commander of Nyssa post of the American Legion.

The boy and girl are selected by the faculty members on the basis of courage, character, service, companionship and scholarship of the girl, and courage, service, scholarship and honor of the boy, Mr. Graham said.

Principal Frank Parr presented the class and said that its members had finished the prescribed course of study.

Other numbers on the program were a song, "Way Over Jordan," girls glee club; vocal solo, "The House I Live In," Spencer Lane, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Lane; song, "Because You're You," girls glee club; presentation of diplomas, R. G. Larson, chairman of the school board, and the recession.

Navy Reserve Open—According to Chiefs G. P. Cleveland and L. R. Lile of the Baker Navy Recruiting station, the U. S. navy is now open for enlistment in the inactive reserve.
