MALHEUR WEEDS RESIST KILLER

The new hormone weed killer, 2, 4-D will give a good kill when used on broad leaved annual weeds, but it is not recommended for complete kills on such weeds as Canada thistle, Russian knapweed, and white top, states George W. Bain, assistant county agent.

The Oregon State college extension service has recently published a bulletin, "2, 4-D for Weed Control in Oregon," in which all of the common weeds are listed as the susceptibility to control by the application of 2, 4-D.

Two common Malheur county weeds, Canada thistle and Russian knapweed, are classified as resistant and the use of 2, 4-D is not recommended for their eradication. However, other common weeds in this locality are classified as susceptible and good kills may be accomplished with 2, 4-D. Blue flowering lettuce, bull thistle, burdock, cheese-weed or mallow, fanweed or scaleweed, prickly lettuce, sweetclover, wild morning glory, water hemlock, and willows are susceptible plants on which 2, 4-D is recommended.

White top is classified as intermediate as to susceptibility. It is believed that repeated applications are necessary to kill this local weed nuisance.

2, 4-D is designed primarily to control weeds mixed in grains and grasses if applied before they start heading out. Crop damage will result if weed control is attempted in broad leaved plantings such as lettuce, beets, potatoes, peas, clover, alfalfa, and celery.

The best time to spray with 2, 4-D is when the temperature is at least 70 degrees and when the weed plants are in an early, vigorously growing stage. Old established weeds are most difficult to kill, Bain explained, because of the well established underground root system.

Farmers should not be overly optimistic and expect to get a total kill with one application of 2, 4-D. Two or more applications are necessary to control wild morning glory, Canada thistle, white top, and Russian knapweed may not be killed outright by applying 2, 4-D, but it prevents them from going to seed.

2, 4-D is not a caustic agent like most weed eradicators, but is absorbed into the system of the plant through leaf openings. It affects the cellular system of the plant and afflicts six to eight weeks will elapse before the final kill is accomplished.

Spraying equipment must be thoroughly cleaned, Bain warns, after using it to spray 2, 4-D there is danger of spraying particles of the weed killer on other crops when the machinery is used for another purpose.

Malheur county farmers are urged to read extension bulletin 665, which is entitled "2, 4-D for Weed Control in Oregon." Copies for general circulation are available at the county agent's office.

low Oregonian who assured me they were doing everything possible to try to find some substitute feed in middle west for shipment to Oregon but had not been able to locate any considerable quantity.

I again impressed upon him importance of borrowing from government wheat supply sufficient wheat to carry us over emergency because as he and I both know large

quantities of wheat now in possession of federal government and scheduled for export will not actually be shipped for many weeks, hence borrowing part of that wheat to meet feed of Oregon will not be taking it out of mouths of hungry people abroad because the crop from southeast will be ready for shipment long before amount of wheat we need to borrow to solve emergency could be shipped, but Washington agriculture department likes sound of this argument which Oregon delegation has emphasized and re-emphasized but they keep telling us there is nothing they can do about it with out orders from white house. We are up against same old buck passing game which characterizes so much of work and effectiveness of various government agencies. I send you this wire because mail and telegrams I am receiving seem to indicate that impression is abroad in Oregon that those of us on Oregon delegation are not doing all we can to solve this problem. My answer to that is that if the people of Oregon could only observe the united fight its delegation has been putting up on this issue and all other issues affecting state they would be mighty proud of way we have been attempting to protect Oregon's interests as to this feed issue. I am not particularly encouraged about ultimate success but as under-secretary of agriculture told me this morning if there is any possible way for department to help work out solution it will be done. I can assure you that each and everyone of us on Oregon's delegation is continuing doing everything we can to find solution to feed problem in Oregon to stop great injustice which is being done."
