AAA NEWS

Program Announced For 1946 Wheat Crop

Loans on the 1946 wheat crop will average about eight cents a bushel above the average of 1945 crop loans, it was announced by Glen L. Hutchinson today. The Portland terminal rate will be \$1.57 a bushel. Farm and warehouse-stored wheat is eligible under the loan program which will be administered by county AAA committees. Wheat loans at 90 per cent of parity at the beginning of the marketing year area legislative mandate under the stabilization act of 1942.

Beef, Sheep and Lamb Feeder Subsidy Stated To End June 30

The beef, sheep and lamb feeder subsidy, which ends on June 30, 1946, was originally put into effect at a time when feed supplies were to encourage feeding operators. Termination of the subsidy is in line with the 1946 grain management program to adjust livestock numbers with feed supplies and free more grains for direct human consumption, particularly in relief areas abroad.

Cattle, sheep and lambs owned by feeder-slaughtering, which meet all other specifications for subsidy payment, must be slaughtered before midnight June 30 to be eligible for subsidy payments. Feeders must deliver the animals for slaughter before the same time. All applications for payment must be filed with the county agricultural conservation officers not later than August 31, 1946. If all information required for payment is not obtained by that date, applications must still be filed by August 31 and more time will be allowed to secure additional information.

Push Is On Potatoes To Save Daily Bread

Urging all customers to make the most effective use possible of potatoes, Secretary Anderson points out that in this way American housewives can make a direct contribution toward relieving the world famine situation by using potatoes instead of scarce cereals badly needed for shipment abroad. A plentiful supply of early potatoes is now coming to markets, with peak shipments expected to be reached within the next two weeks. For the two-week period ending June 8, potato shipments from early-producing states totaled 19,675 cars, over 8000 cars more than shipped during the same period last year.

The price support program on early crop potatoes is being readied in Malheur county, Hutchinson, announced. The price will be supported at \$1.70 per cwt. on No. 1 potatoes during July and August through government purchase from certified dealers.

NEW HAY INVENTION GIVEN PUBLICITY

A needle in a haystack is more than something to hunt, in the opinion of Claude Butts, foreman of the Norman Elliott ranch in Baker county, who has invented a haystack needle that cuts the work of cattle feeding to about a third of the labor required by hand methods.

This needle, just described in detail in extension bulletin 666 issued by Oregon State college, makes possible threading cables through a haystack so that an entire load of hay may be dumped off onto a feeding sled with one pull of a team or tractor.

This home-made device consists of a needle point made from a section of a harrow disc. This is in the institution's capital funds welded to a threaded rod coupling since 1910 have come from earn-

The same team or tractor that pulled the sled can then roll the part of the stack above the cables onto the sled with ease.

Clyde Walker and Myron G. Crosey, authors of the bulletin now available at county extension offices, report that two men experienced with this method can drive alongside a stack, place the cables and load from two to three tons of hay on a sled in 10 minutes or less with a minimum of labor.

MONEY CHANGED TO SURPLUS ACCOUNT
