RECLAMATION ERA PRINTING RESUMED

The first post-war issue of "The Reclamation Era", official magazine of the bureau of reclamation department of the interior, publication of which was halted for four years during the war, was received today by Pacific northwest subscribers. Regional Director R. J. Newell announced. Articles by newly-appointed Secretary of the Interior Julius A. Krug and Commissioner of Reclamation Michael A. Struss featured the first edition of the publication, which has wide circulation outside government channels, particularly among irrigation districts and water users.

The illustrated periodical is devoted to telling, in popular style, the story of land and water resource development in the west. It is self-supporting. The former subscription rate of \$1 per year for 12 issues remains in effect, Mr. Newell said. Unexpired subscriptions will be honored, and subscribers will receive the number of issues due.

ROUGH STOCK IS SECURED FOR RODEO

With an increase in the size of purses for all competitive events, the Snake River stampede, scheduled for July 11, 12 and 13, when many of the nation's top cowboys will pit their strength against the highest string of stock that Leo Cremer of Big Timber, Montana can round-up.
Always a spectacular event, this year's show promises to best previous performances, with three full days of rodeo under the lights at Nampa's rodeo park. Tickets for the show are available in Nyssa at the Olympic club.
An amateur bronc riding purse of \$300 will be given by the stampede association this year, doubling last year's prize money. Purses for other events will total \$3000.
Fans will again see a number of favorite broncs in action, including "Bald Hornet", "Golden Fan", "Pearl Harbor", and "Lee Rider", well as broncs from a new string purchased this year by Cremer. Calf roping, bulldogging, and Brahma bull riding will round out the show, along with two of the rodeo's favorite clown, and several specialty acts.
