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## DAIRY PROSPECTS ENCOURAGING

The report of Chris Kolbeck to his company, the Avoset corporation, on the dairy situation in the Nyssa section, reveals that the cow population of the district is far short of what was expected, but nevertheless it gives encouragement that this territory will become a major dairying section.

Kolbeck contacted 515 farmers who own only 4508 cows. However, the encouraging feature of the situation is that dairymen expect to increase their herds by an average of 50 per cent, and other farmers plan to re-enter the dairying field.

Many farmers in this area have quit the dairy business for various reasons, including attractive prices for row crops and shortage of labor. With an adequate labor supply, more farmers should be able to increase their dairy herds to meet the greater demand for local processing of milk and at the same time maintain their row crop production.

Malheur county is essentially a row crop and dairy section so that farmers and specialists should be able to develop a program that would avoid conflict and strike a balance most beneficial to the farmers and the community generally. Rotation of farm crops and steady production in the farm dairies should spell prosperity for this county.

**Reclamation Bureau Positions Are Open**  
Federal civil service announces an examination for permanent professional appointments to engineering aid positions in the bureau of reclamation.

Persons who desire permanent positions will have an opportunity to file for a civil service examination leading to probational appointments with permanent classified civil service status in engineering aid positions in the western United States.

The entrance salaries for these positions range from \$2644.80 to \$3397.20 a year.  
The appointees will perform sub-professional engineering work in a specific branch of engineering, such as agricultural, architectural, civil, computations, construction, electrical, general, hydraulic, hydrologic, materials laboratory, mechanical, and survey.

Applicants for this examination will be graded on the basis of their experience, education and training--no written test is required. Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 62, except that these age limits may be waived for veterans and under certain conditions for war service indefinite employees. Further information on this examination and the necessary application forms for applying may be obtained from the secretary, board of U. S. civil service examiners, at any first or second class post office or from the director, eleventh U. S. civil service region, room 4, Central building, Seattle, Washington. Applications must be received in the Central board of U. S. civil service examiners' office, Continental Oil building, Denver 2, Colorado.
