

GRANGE IS ASKING CHECK ON SUGAR

The executive committee of the Oregon State Grange passed a resolution at a recent meeting in Portland asking for an immediate re-survey of sugar stocks.

The resolution reads as follows: "WHEREAS the present sugar allocation for home canning is entirely inadequate to care for home canning needs, and

"WHEREAS, even at this early date in the season, there is considerable wastage of fresh fruits

now ripening, due to lack of canning sugar by housewives, and "WHEREAS this is resulting in depressed market prices for a number of products, and

"WHEREAS there are conflicting reports as to the amount of sugar on hand in this country; therefore be it

"RESOLVED, by the executive committee of the Oregon State Grange that we ask our delegation in congress to request an immediate re-survey of sugar stocks and allocations with the purpose of increasing sugar allotments for home canning purposes".

RANGE LAND BURNED OVER IN VALE AREA

A range fire in the hills east of Vale burned over 3,600 acres of pasture land east of the Saddle and south to Lytle boulevard. It was confined on the east by the Owyhee ditch.

Grazing service crews backfired from Lytle boulevard and cut fire guards through the hills to the east in an effort to stem the blaze. No cattle were endangered it was reported.

Martin H. Galt, grazing service director here, said that the range is very dry at this time and that every precaution should be taken to prevent the beginning of fires. A state law, enforced by the state fire marshal, prohibits the starting

of any type of fire that might endanger range land throughout the period of the dry season and makes it mandatory that a burning permit be obtained where such a fire is to be started.

While the Scott batters were trying to duplicate their first inning uprising—but with little success—the Nyssa hitters suddenly jumped on Cline for four runs in the fourth canto which turned out to be the winning margin. The rally wasn't Cline's fault entirely, however, as two costly errors gave the Beet Pickers two unearned runs. In fact, only one hit was made in the big inning, but two walks, three stolen bases and the aforementioned bobbles did the damage.

The Clothiers, trailing 5-2 going into the final frame, put on a little spurt to score their final run. With one out Wendt drew a walk and came all the way home when Anderson rifled a double to left center field. The rally died, however, as Sowers and Wright lofted out to end the contest.

The second game was close all the way with neither squad holding more than a two-run advantage at any one time. Nyssa opened the fireworks in the second frame by scoring one run on a walk and two singles, and adding another marker in the third on a hit and a KC error.

Kilbury, playing shortstop for the Knights of Columbus, scored his team's first run of the game by driving a long home run into the extreme left field corner of the ball park. The ball dropped just out of the reach of the charging left fielder, Bellon, and rolled to the fence.

Three singles in the fourth put Nyssa ahead 3-1, but the Knights came back with a run in their half of the frame when Nelson doubled down the left field line, took third as the left fielder fumbled in the field and scored on an infield out.

The KC's finally knotted the count in the fifth as Bowen, leading off, went all the way to second when the pitcher threw his bunt over the first baseman's head. Paul Castle then scored him with a steaming double to right center—and it looked like a big rally was on. However, the Nyssa chucker settle down and forced French, Stone and Crapo to loft out to end the inning.

An unearned Nyssa run in the sixth proved to be the winning margin as Hendricks, playing second base for the Beet Pickers, reached second when the center-fielder dropped his low line drive. He scored a moment later when Pitcher Holman lined his third hit of the game into right field.

The KC hitters made only four hits off Holman, but all of them were for extra bases, three being

doubles and one the aforementioned homer by Kilburg. On the other hand, Nyssa batters touched Hurier Jack Frech for eight blows, but they were all singles and Jack kept them well scattered.
