BANK COMMISSIONER LOANS ARE RENEWED

Congress has extended the time for making land bank commissioner loans to July 1, 1947. Herbert J. Davis, secretary-treasurer of the Payette National Farm Loan association, is advised by R. E. Brown, president of the Federal Land bank of Spokane. Authority to make these loans had expired on the first of this month.

Commissioner loans, made through the facilities of the land bank and national farm loan associations, may be secured by either a first or second mortgage but may not exceed 75 per cent of the appraised normal value of the property, Mr. Davis said. Commissioner loans bear 5 per cent interest while regular land bank loans are made at 4 per cent.
