FSA PROGRAM GETS PERMANENT STATUS

Few major changes are expected in the Malheur county farm security administration program as a result of the farmers home administration act or "Cooley bill," which passed congress shortly before adjournment and was sent to the president's desk for signature, according to word received by D. J. Kudrna, county FSA supervisor, Wilson building, Ontario.

Present FSA programs are given permanent status in the department of agriculture under the legislation and are consolidated with the emergency crop and seed loan program of the farm credit administration, under a new agency to be known as the farmers home administration, said Kudrna. Merger of the two credit agencies is to be completed within 90 days after the bill becomes law, but is not expected to effect present

Producers May Alter Insurance

The operators of Malheur county farms covered this year by federal wheat crop insurance were advised today by Glen L. Hutchinson, chairman of the county AAA committee, that they may cancel the remaining two years of their present contracts by signing a new three-year agreement at the more favorable yields approved for 1947.

Average yields for county farms have been raised, for insurance on 1947 wheat crops, Mr. Hutchinson said. The revisions were made by the Federal Crop Insurance corporation on the basis of new information on production and losses. All new contracts will be written at the 1947 yields and rates, and growers who are now insured at the old figures may replace their present insurance by signing a new contract to cover the 1947, and 1948 and 1949 crops. Mr. Hutchinson said. Unless a new contract is signed, the old contracts at the 1946 yields and rates will remain in effect for two more years.
